 San Francisco Police Raid Headquarters of Plotters and Secure Damaging Evidence.
 SAN FRANCISCO, Aug. 1.—Documentary evidence sufficient to convict those in custody on a charge of causing the bomb explosion ten days ago during the preparation parade, when nine persons were killed and forty injured, is in the hands of the police to-day, according to District Attorney C. M. Fickert.
 A raid last night by the police on the headquarters of the alleged leaders of the plot resulted in the confiscation of the private letter file and

other papers of Thomas Monsey, labor agitator, suspected of being concerned in plotting the bomb.
 According to Mr. Fickert, the letters contain important evidence regarding the explosion, as well as information bearing on the wreckage of the Los Angeles Times building a year ago.
 In one of the letters written by Monsey just prior to the preparation parade he said, according to Fickert: "If I can pull off what I am planning, I will be the biggest man in San Francisco labor circles."
