GARMENT STRIKE WILL END FRIDAY, IS NEW PROMISE

Prospect of Federal Inquiry Brings Leaders Together for Final Parley.

Strikes in action by the appointment of a Federal Mediation Board which has been empowered to set aside mediation in the garment workers' strike, but to investigate the whole industry, both parties to the prolonged controversy have gotten together once more and it was announced today that the strike would be ended and the men back at work not later than Friday morning.

"We are to have a full conference at the McAlpin Hotel this afternoon, with fourteen representatives from each side," said Morris Hillquit, organizer for the garment workers' union, "and we expect that this will be the final meeting. Concessions have been made which are satisfactory to the union, and because of these concessions it will not be necessary for either side to meet the Federal Mediation Board at the City Hall today. The matter will be put to a referendum vote tomorrow and I hope and expect that all the strikers will be back at work no later than Friday morning."

When the agreement which was supposed to have ended the strike a week ago Monday was rejected by the mass of the workers the Federal Government appointed a board of mediators composed of James A. Moffit of Orange, N. J., President of the National Union, Ethelbert Stewart, Assistant Commissioner of Labor Statistics for the Department of Labor at Washington, and Charles W. Mills, a Philadelphia coal operator. Hints that this board would undertake a searching inquiry into all the details of the garment industry seemed to move both union men and employers to make still another effort to adjust their differences. A series of quiet conferences was held on Sunday, Monday and Tuesday, with the result that today's full conference is expected to put an end to the strike.

The Federal mediators arrived in New York today and it is understood that they will not be satisfied with any tentative agreement between the manufacturers and the strikers unless it bears evidence of offering a full and final solution of the whole problem. Following a temporary lockout by manufacturers of men's clothing in the downtown district last night, 15,000 members of the Amalgamated Clothing Workers of America went on strike. The union threatens to call out to-day the entire membership of 60,000.

"The sort of man I want must be a man who has an education and who works with his brain; one for whom

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

STATE BEGINS WAR ON RAINESE LAW HOTELS

Application Already Made for the Revocation of Nineteen Licenses Illegally Obtained.

BINGHAMTON, N. Y., Aug. 1.—A State-wide movement by the State Excise Department to regulate all hotels illegally holding licenses and abolish those of the Raine law variety was inaugurated here when application was made by representatives of the State Department before Supreme Court Justice Davis for the revocation of nineteen hotel licenses in this city for violating Section 30 of the liquor law.

The proprietors will be given a hearing Aug. 8.

Similar action will be taken in other cities of the State.
