Muscles Don't Always Indicate Strength

MUSCLES DON'T ALWAYS INDICATE GREAT STRENGTH

Study of Famous Strong Men Shows that Strength is Where You Find It—Athletes, to Possess Great Physical Power, Need Not Be Like a Statue of Hercules—Strength is So Mysterious That Little Men Have Competed Successfully Against Giants.

It's the old problem of horse-power. One horse-power—the standard invented by James Watt to measure the working capacity of the steam engine—is the amount of energy expended in raising 33,000 pounds one foot in one minute. Raising one foot 33,000 feet in one minute, or raising one pound one foot 33,000 times in one minute, amounts to the same thing.

When Pat McDonald, the gigantic weight thrower, heaves a 56-pound weight to a record height or distance, or puts a 16-pound shot fifty feet or more, his exhibition of strength makes the spectators gasp. And yet in the course of ten minutes on the athletic field little Hannes Kolehmainen, the distance runner, develops more horse-power than Pat McDonald in the same length of time.

SKINNY LEGS SUPPORTED A VERY STRONG MAN. I've known many of the strongest men in the world, and in the whole lot no two that I can remember were alike in physique. Some were tall and lean, others short and chunky.

GIANT AND MIDGET COMPETE AS RIVAL SHOT PUTTERS. At New Orleans, in the National Championships, I saw a unique sight. Ralph Rose, 6 feet 3 inches tall and weighing 315 pounds, and Pat McDonald, who was 5 feet 4 and weighed about 235, were putting the shot.

WORLD'S GREATEST "STRONG MAN" WAS FAT. Louis Cyr of Canada was the greatest of all professional strong men. His weight over his feet almost beyond belief. He was an enormous man, fat and heavily muscled.



