Failures are stepping stones more than successes if one knows how to use them rightly, as every philosopher from St. Augustine down has told us, and it is quite as true in regard to clothes as anything else. There are few women blessed with the faculty of knowing herself, her purse, her social requirements, and all other things which are affected by clothes, well enough to never make mistakes. And for the woman of limited purse, the pitiful part of mistakes is that she must wear her clothes just the same; she cannot afford to cast them away.

A wise plan for any woman who contemplates new clothes is to determine in her mind, from among the clothes she has, which ones she likes the best. Then she should find out what it is about each frock that makes her like it, if she doesn't already know. In the same way she should study well the ones she does not like and find out just what the reasons are.

She will in this way come to some definite idea as to what she wants to avoid and what she wants to strive for in her new clothes. She will not be influenced, as perhaps she was at some other time, by a pretty color, an elegant fabric or odd design, or anything else which is attractive but not becoming or suitable to herself.

DESCRIPTION OF THE MODEL.

The pretty model for an evening gown, which I am picturing to-day will appeal to the slender woman, who likes youthful clothes, yet demands a certain amount of character in them. At the right is suggested a bright blue or purple satin for its construction. Though the plain foundation bodice is frugal indeed, the skirt more generously exploits considerable fabric into a puff and ruffle to give a pretentious trimming just below the hip line. In the front, however, the skirt calls to aid no more mental an accessory than an apron, but refines it to such an extent that even the most fastidious could not but approve of its honored place on this evening frock. Of delicate self-colored net, bedstrewn with sparkling beads, it is dropped from several rows of shir-



ings five inches below the belt. At the bottom a band of braid and bead embroidery effectively finishes it, and contrasts delightfully with the soft gray or white fur just below it on the edge of the skirt. Another pleasing opportunity for such a contrast is when in lieu of a sleeve a fur band is placed around the arm, where jeweled tassels hang languidly from the shoulders away against it. A deep collar in back and a like panel in front make a sparkling pretense of the bead sewn net, to relieve the extreme décolletage of the

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MEXICAN DIPLOMAT ACCUSES BRITISH OF MISTREATMENT

Declares an Attempt Was Made to Search Baggage in New York Harbor.

BERLIN, Sept. 13 (by wireless to Sayville).—Dr. Krum Heller, a Mexican diplomatist with proper credentials, was compelled by the British to cross the Atlantic three times before proceeding to Switzerland, according to the Overseas News Agency.

Dr. Heller, who holds a colonel's commission in the Constitutionalist army, was sent by Gen. Carranza, the news agency says, to express the thanks of Mexico for Switzerland's recognition of the Carranza Government. He is quoted as having said to a representative of the Tagblatt of Berne, Switzerland, that he started from New York four months ago, having taken the precaution to obtain from the American Government an official certificate of his identity in addition to his official Mexican papers.

According to this account, a British agent attempted search Dr. Heller's baggage on board his steamer,

dropping to within an inch of the waist line. Here the elegant bead and braid banding serves an effective finishing.

One's choice should depend on the material of the bodice. If its glimmer is soft, with just the colored beads sparkling over it, silver ribbon could be used; but if it is more gorgeous in its sparkle, the velvet ribbon should veer its veiling. The dainty chiffon apron is finished accordingly, completing an adorable, simply made frock.

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
