SOCIALISTS STRONG FOR WILSON, TRADES UNION MEN TOO

Men Who Labor and Think Abandon Other Candidates for the President.

"All who want war are against Wilson," writes Clarence Darrow, counsel for many international unions and general adviser of miners' unions, in the current issue of The Citizen, a labor weekly published in San Francisco. The Citizen is supporting the President for re-election and predicts that he will get 70 per cent of the votes of 500,000 organized workers in California. "The people managing Mr. Wilson's campaign," Mr. Darrow's article reads, "did well when they said that the country needs Wilson more than we need him. If ever organized labor had an opportunity to show its real strength and its sympathy for a national candidate it is at the present time. Wil-

son should get the vote of every worker if for no other reason than this—he kept the country out of war, and in doing so sacrificed none of its dignity, none of its best ideals." Darrow and other well known leaders have been stumping California for the President. Two weeks ago the Socialist leaders frankly admitted that the President would get a large part of the total Socialist vote of the country, but they contended that it would come largely from the intellectual group. Within the last few days informal polls show a decided change in the attitude of Socialists

in general, and particularly those who vote in the Socialist Labor Party column. Frank J. Harrington, a Socialist Labor Party leader from St. Louis, now at the Broadway Central, told a reporter for The Evening World that in the Western States neither the Socialist Party proper nor any of the "reformed political bodies that have grown out of it" are making any effort to persuade the voters in this group from voting for Wilson. "I say that," he said, "in spite of the fact that all the Socialist groups are working harder this year than

ever to elect their candidates and State candidates, too, if they could—but my opinion, based on statements made to me by members of my own party and from general observation, is that President Wilson is very popular with the rank and file of Socialism and will get equally as many votes from the workers in this political group as he undoubtedly will from the intellectuals. I would say that sentiment now seems to me to be about fifty-fifty. About one-half will vote for him and their local candidates, the other half for their own national and State tickets.


