

CHURCH MEMBERS AIDING MOTHER IN SEARCH FOR GIRL

Mrs. Knappman Keeps Up Continuous Hunt for Her Daughter Edna.

If you should see a middle aged woman with her hair turning prematurely gray wander into a cabaret, or looking anxiously about the streets she will probably be Mrs. Mary Knappman of No. 546 Van Buren Street, Brooklyn, who is searching for her fifteen-year-old daughter Edna May, who mysteriously disappeared Friday, Dec. 12, and has not been heard of since.

The mother has been searching for her daughter since her disappearance twenty hours out of every twenty-four. She goes about in a taxi-cab most of the time, but frequently walks, and she is becoming so weak that she has recently collapsed several times in the streets.

Edna, with her sister, Katherine, both sing in the choir of Christ English Lutheran Church at Lafayette and Patchen Avenues, Brooklyn, and on the night of Dec. 12 they started for choir rehearsal. They found that the rehearsal had been postponed and started for a walk.

About 8:30 o'clock they met three shabbily dressed young men at Gates and Reid Avenues. The men seemed to know Edna, according to her sister, who went back to the church and left her with them. The sister waited for more than an hour, and then when Edna did not show up she went home, told the mother her story and the search began.

Edna is an attractive girl with dark brown hair and blue eyes, five feet six inches in height and weighs 145 pounds. When she disappeared she was wearing a dark velvet coat, a brown skirt, a black hat and black shoes and stockings. She has a rich soprano voice and was a favorite in church and home circles.

"If she will only come home," said Mrs. Knappman to-day, "I will forgive her no matter what she has done. Edna was always a sweet, affectionate girl and had no love affair that I ever heard of. I don't think she would go on the stage, but she was crazy about the movies and she often expressed a wish to act in them."

"If she doesn't return soon I shall die of a broken heart or go to an insane asylum. Just look at my hair. Why before Edna went away there was not a gray hair in my head, and now it is nearly entirely white."

Mrs. Knappman said she feared the young men whom her daughter went away with are "cadets." This is the reason that she is now searching not only the better class cabarets and music halls, but the saloons and dives in the slums and red light districts of New York and Brooklyn.

Eight hundred members of the church and the pastor, the Rev. Karl Schuchard, have organized searching parties. Fifteen friends of the mother meet at her home every night and go out in squads searching the streets and avenues of the city.

The mother has had 1,000 circulars printed bearing her daughter's picture and her description and she has had these placed in cabarets and saloons and dives and dance halls. Detectives have begun a search of the moving picture studios and theatrical agencies.

Edna, up to two weeks before her disappearance, attended the Bushwick High School, but then went to work in a department store.

RUTH LAW WATCHES HER NEW AIRPLANE IN FLIGHT

Woman Aviator Claps Her Hands With Glee as Carlstrom Tries Out Speedy Curtiss Triplane.

NORFOLK, Jan. 5.—Ruth Law, the champion woman aviator of America, stood on terra firma yesterday and saw Victor Carlstrom rise to a height of several thousand feet in her new triplane, built especially for her by the Curtiss Company.

Carlstrom flew over Hampton Roads and then circled Newport News and Fortress Monroe. The average speed was more than 75 miles an hour, and better could have been made. The machine behaved beautifully and Miss Law clapped her hands with glee when she saw it glide and rise gracefully at the will of the operator.

The flight was made from the grounds of the Curtiss Company's aviation school at Newport News. Yesterday was the first time the machine ever left the earth. Miss Law was not afraid to be the first to make a flight in it, but wanted to see how it behaved by observing another handle it. To-day she plans to make a flight alone in it.

The machine is of 119 horse-power and was built to make ninety miles an hour. A photograph of it with Miss Law at the controls was taken the first day it was run out of the construction shed.


