CHARGE THAT SHIP CO. WAS WRECKED BY DESIGN UPHELD

Vice Chancellor Accuses E. D. Robbins of Destroying Line C. W. Morse Built Up.

The charges of Miss Jennie B. Morse, a sister of Charles W. Morse, that the Metropolitan Steamship Company has been deliberately wrecked were upheld today in a decision handed down by Vice-Chancellor Lane in Newark, before whom arguments following a long trial, have been presented for three weeks.

The decision brings an end to litigation instigated by Miss Morse that has extended over a period of two years. In a later decision Vice-Chancellor Lane will determine whether a receiver shall be appointed for the Metropolitan Steamship Company or some other method of rehabilitating the property or satisfying the claims of the creditors and stockholders shall be ordered.

CHURCHMEN SEE WILSON IN BEHALF OF ALIENS

Committee Urges Support of Legislation to Protect Foreigners in the United States.

WASHINGTON, Jan. 24.—A committee from the Federal Council of the Churches of Christ in America, headed by Bishop Earl H. Gibson of this city, called on President Wilson today and also appeared before the Senate Foreign Relations Committee, urging resolutions in support of legislation to provide for adequate protection of aliens in this country and for the creation of a Federal Commission of not less than five members for the study of the entire problem of the relations of America with Japan and China.

OWNER IS HELD UP AND ROBBED IN RESTAURANT

Grappling With Assailant, Who Later Charges That Waiter Planned Job.

Detective Mitchell of Inspector Dwyer's staff heard a commotion early today in the Manhattan Lunchroom, at No. 4 Chatham Square. Inside he found John Jevankastecio, the proprietor, fighting a man who later described himself as Dominico Batto, twenty-four, of No. 3 Mulberry Street.

The restaurant man charged that Batto had robbed him after using a blackjack. The police say they found on Batto \$202 alleged to have been taken from the lunchman's pocket and a check for \$200.

UNIVERSAL TAX FOR FRANCE.

Five Francs a Year for Every Resident—Increase in Present Levies. PARIS, Jan. 24.—The new plan of taxation of Finance Minister Ribot includes an annual personal tax of five francs on every resident of France, citizen or foreigner, who has an income.

WEALTHY BUILDER ACCUSED OF PART IN BURNING AUTOS

Convicted Plotters Declare R. C. Sack Collected \$14,700 on Seven Trucks.

How Richard C. Sack, a wealthy builder of Richmond Hill, L. I., is alleged to have collected insurance amounting to \$14,700 on seven motor trucks which he had been unable to sell in the open market was told today to a jury before Judge Nott in General Sessions by Frederick Strobel, formerly sales manager of the Moon Auto Sales Company of Brooklyn, and Walter Schapinsky, a mechanic for the same company.

Both Strobel and Schapinsky, who were indicted with Sack, have pleaded guilty, and were called as witnesses by Assistant District Attorney Royal H. Weller, who is prosecuting the case.
