CONGRESS HAD POWER TO FIX HOURS AND PAY FOR RAILROAD MEN

players, citing the "Hours of Service Act" and others, and held there was authority of Congress to act because of failure of the railroads and employees to reach an agreement.

The railroads could not object to fixing a standard of wages, he said, because in the deadlock none was fixed.

Chief Justice White, in his opinion, concluded: "We say that the constitution that the act was void and could not be made operative because of the unworkability of its provisions is without merit, since we see no reason to doubt that if the standard fixed by the act were made applicable and a candid effort followed to carry it out, the result would be without difficulty accomplished. It is true that it might follow that in some cases that because of particular terms of employment or exceptional surroundings some change might be necessary, but these exceptions afford no ground for holding the act void because its provisions are not susceptible in practice of being carried out."

HOLDS CONGRESS HAD POWER TO ADOPT THE ACT.

OLIVER'S SIGNATURE STRANGE TO J. W. OSBORNE'S BANKER

Teller, Familiar With Lawyer's Handwriting, Testifies at the Tanzer Perjury Trial.

The defense rested today in the retrial of Rae Tanzer for perjury before Judge Van Fleet in the United States District Court. The State began its rebuttal.

Prior to this William Rand Jr., for the Government, cross-examined Albert Hamilton, a handwriting expert, who testified Friday that James W. Osborne, in his opinion, wrote the letters signed "Oliver Osborne" to Miss Tanzer. The expert swore today that James W. Osborne had used four kinds of "system forms" in writing to his wife from Providence in December, 1914.

The first witness called in rebuttal

was Harry F. Montgomery, paying teller in the People's Trust Company, Brooklyn, who said he was familiar with James W. Osborne's signature and that the signature "Oliver Osborne" on some of the letters was not, in his opinion, in Mr. Osborne's handwriting.

"TEX" MILLMAN DEAD.

Aviator Dies of Pneumonia at His Hempstead Home.

"Tex" Millman, whose real name was Peter Carl, one of the most expert aviators in this country, although he was only twenty-two years old, died today of pneumonia at his home, No. 101 Jerusalem Avenue, Hempstead, L. I. His bride of five months survives him.

Millman took up aviation when he was only seventeen years old, becoming first a mechanic's helper for one of the companies demonstrating aeroplanes on the Hempstead Plains. In a very short time he essayed to learn the art of flying and soon became dar-

ingly expert in the management of machines. A year ago he assumed instructorship in the First Aero Corps, training many fliers for the Government service. Although known for his reckless skill, Millman had never had an accident. He was one of the band of bird men who flew last December from Hempstead to the League Island Navy Yard at Philadelphia.

CHIEF PROVISIONS OF ADAMSON LAW UPHeld AS VALID.

BEGINNING Jan. 1 last, eight hours shall, in contracts for labor and service, be deemed a day's work, and the measure and standard of a day's work for the purpose of reckoning compensation for services of all employees who now or hereafter may be employed by any common carrier by railroad, except railroads independently owned and operated and not exceeding 100 miles in length, electric street railroads and electric interurban railroads.

Under section two the President is ordered to appoint a commission of three to investigate and report on effects of operation of the law, especially the necessary pay increases. This commission is to report its findings to the President and Congress within from six to ten months from date of organization. Section three provides that pending the commission's report compensation shall not be reduced below the present standard, and for all time in excess of eight hours employees affected shall be paid at a rate not less than the pro rata rate for such standard eight hour work day. Section four provides \$100 to \$1,000 fine or a year's imprisonment or both for violations.

The delay was asked for by a property owner on the ground that there was hope that by a year from now a new Board of Estimate might be in power which would act on a change of plan which has been before the Board for more than fifty months.

Justice Day, in a dissenting opinion, said the legislation amounted to "deprivation of the railroads' property without due process of law." The dissenting opinion, held that the law should be held unconstitutional and void "because Congress, although confessedly not in possession of information necessary for intelligent and just treatment of the controversy, arbitrarily imposed upon the railroads the entire and enormous cost of an experimental increase in wages."

Justice McKenna concurred in the majority opinion, but on slightly different grounds. Justice Day read his own dissenting opinion and Justice Pitney delivered the other dissenting opinion in which Justice Van Devanter joined.

The immediate temporary wage increase won by the railroad employees affect 400,000 trainmen, as of January 1 and are estimated to total between \$40,000,000 and \$50,000,000.

Mrs. Dispielo was removed to the Eastern District Hospital. Her wounds are not serious.

RUTH LAW COMING HOME WITH BELGIAN POLICE DOG

Aviatrice Gets Special Permission to Take "Poulu" Out of France.

PARIS, March 18.—Miss Ruth Law, who will sail for New York Saturday, has purchased a trained Belgian police dog named "Poulu," meaning "hairy one," and being a slang name for a French soldier. The aviatrice obtained special permission from the authorities to take the dog out of France, as all animals of that breed are mobilized at the front to aid

wounded soldiers. She intends to fly with Poulu in the United States. The present high cost here was illustrated when Miss Law's hotel announced that the cost of keeping dogs here had been increased to \$2 a day, not including meals. It formerly cost \$1 a day.
