**15 SHIPS ARRIVE;
13 HELD OUTSIDE
BY 65-MILE GALE**

Eight Passed Through War Zone—American Diplomats Are Home.

With a chilling gale blowing out of the northwest at sixty-five miles an hour fifteen steamers made quarantine this morning, eight of them having sailed safely through the "barred zone." Owing to the wind, the overdue Cunard liner Saxonia and the Pan-nonia were the only ships able to reach pier.

The Norwegian-American liner Ronensjord arrived from Bergen, by way of Halifax, with freight and eight passengers—Charles J. Vopicka, United States Minister to Roumania and his suite, and Jefferson Cassery, American Charge d'Affaires at Teheran, Persia. The liner is a freighter, but the owners extended the courtesy of the ship to the diplomats, who were the only Americans who could get out of Norway.

It was said by the agents of the line that the diplomats would be compelled

to remain on the steamer all day, the weather not permitting of sending a tug alongside. The Weather Bureau's forecast of the gale is that there will be little decrease in its violence until sunset.

Besides the Saxonia and the Pan-nonia, there came through the barred zone the American steam freighter Omega from Brixham and Vacuum from London; and the British freighters Denis from Liverpool, Olympia from Marseilles, Eastgate from La Pallice and the Brendon from Genoa.

Other arrivals were the American steamer Mexico from Havana, Carolina from San Juan, Venator from Matanzas and the Philadelphia from San Domingo; and the British steamer Brighton from Kingston, Jamaica.

Dr. Austin Flint of No. 61 West Fifty-second Street, who performed the operation, said today that his patient was in no danger and would probably be able to leave the hospital a few days hence.

**LITTLE GIRL HIT
BY HALF BULLET;
KILLED IN PARK**

Death of Dorothy O'Connell in Auto Blamed on Target Shooters in Van Cortlandt.

The Coroner and police were convinced today that the death of Dorothy O'Connell, thirteen years old, while automobiling in Van Cortlandt Park yesterday afternoon, was due to promiscuous target practice of boys in secluded sections of the park.

There have been many complaints, especially from motorists, of the reckless discharge of firearms in parks of the Bronx, and the death of the girl will cause drastic measures to stop it. The little girl was the daughter of Mrs. Evelyn O'Connell, a widow, of No. 3046 Heath Avenue, the Bronx. Yesterday she called on her chum, Hazel Fitzgerald, of No. 3021 Heath Avenue, Hazel and her brother, Walter, Frank Kern of No. 1317 Franklin Avenue and Miss Olive Redmond of No. 182 Macos Street, Brooklyn, were preparing to take an auto ride and invited Dorothy to accompany them.

They drove about Van Cortlandt for half an hour, finally turning into Moshulu Parkway. As the machine crossed the Central tracks, 300 feet

east of Broadway, the occupants heard a popping noise and Dorothy cried:

"Something hit me in the head." The others thought boys were throwing stones at them and the men got out, but found no one. Then Dorothy began to cry and to complain of a headache. As the car started she faintly. By the time they reached a doctor she was dead. An autopsy showed half a bullet, probably broken when deflected by a rock, had entered her head below the left ear.

Soon afterward the police arrested a man who said he was George Elliott, a ship carpenter, twenty-one years old, and that he had reached New York yesterday morning from Philadelphia, where he lived at No. 1515 Greenway Avenue. Boy scouts had told of a man with a revolver and silence, and Elliott was traced to the Yonkers line and captured.

Other boys said they had seen the marksman unscrew the silencer and throw both silencer and the pistol away. They indicated in a general way the place, and there the weapon and silencer were found.

Elliott denied he had carried a revolver. He admitted that he had been in the park, but said he had not shot a pistol there. He was locked up charged with violating the Sullivan law after several boy scouts had identified him as the man who was practicing with a revolver in the park.

The boy scouts were of great aid to the police in rounding up lads who had been using revolvers in the park. They told where three lads had a camp, and here were found three youngsters with revolvers and a rifle.

They were taken to the police station charged with juvenile delinquency. They said they were Charles Mueller, fifteen, of No. 322 East Eighty-ninth Street; Dewitt Brown, nine, same address, and George Laughlin, thirteen, No. 75 East Ninety-fourth Street.

**GIRL'S SUIT FOR MILLION
AGAINST BANKER OF 83
FAILS TO WORRY HIM**

Manning and Miss O'Brien Both in Retirement After Filing of Action.

Miss Honora May O'Brien, the Skibbereen beauty, who has just brought suit against John B. Manning, the eighty-three-year-old millionaire banker of No. 81 Riverside Drive, for \$1,000,000 for jilting her over the telephone the day before they were to have been married last December, was not to be found today. At the home of the Misses O'Connor, No. 528 Riverside Drive, where Miss O'Brien was stopping last December, one of her girl friends proceeded to know nothing of her whereabouts.

"Miss O'Brien left here about Christmas," said Miss O'Connor. "We have no idea where she is and don't care. We don't speak any more."

Stephen C. Baldwin, Miss O'Brien's attorney, is in Florida and some of his assistants would discuss the suit. Mr. Manning was not at his office, No. 2 Wall Street, or at his home, but servants at the latter place said that

the Manning family was not interested in Miss O'Brien's suit. Martin W. Littleton is attorney for the aged banker. He has entered a general denial to the suit, which was filed in Queens County.

Manning, reputed to be worth \$15,000,000, is one of the most influential Catholics in the city, being a Knight of St. Gregory, one of the highest orders which laymen may obtain. Because of his prominence in the church it is understood great pressure has been brought to have the matter settled out of court. John J. Manning, a son of the banker, is a member of the New York Stock Exchange.
