**Two Young Frenchmen on Way to Homes in Tahiti to Recover.**  
Nine young Frenchmen who lived on the island of Tahiti in the Pacific offered themselves to France when she went to war, and only two of them have come back alive. These two are on their way to Tahiti to recover from wounds, and left Ellis Island this afternoon to take up another stage of their 21,000-mile journey homeward.  
They are Eric Juvenin, with a shrapnel wound in his shoulder, and Marcel Bonnet, with several rifle wounds in his body. They brought a staggering collection of relics, including several German helmets. They arrived here yesterday on the French liner Espagne.
