

WORLD'S BIGGEST FLAG, HISTORIC WORK OF ART, ADORNS BUILDING HERE

Made by Miss Mulford, of Madison, N. J.—"Every Stitch a Soldier."

The largest flag in the world—the American ensign which is displayed across the Fifth Avenue facade of B. Altman & Co.'s building, a blaze of color by day and illuminated at night by searchlights across the way—has historic as well as patriotic value. It was designed and made by hand, every stitch of it, by Miss Josephine Mulford of Madison, N. J., during the war between this country and Spain, in 1898. And each stitch, as Miss Mulford put it in, was intended to represent a soldier or a sailor of this Nation in the war.

For those who are interested in figures it may be said that the flag measures 100 feet by, which is the lengthwise designation, and 35 feet wide, which is the width. Each star is 2 feet 8 inches across and the stripes are 5 feet wide. All the bunting for the flag was woven especially for it, and every stitch in it was made in silk.

The stars in the blue field are embroidered with the names of the States they represent, with the date of their entry into the Union, and are arranged in the order of that entry. Five of the stars were made by Miss Mulford in historic places in the States they represent.

The Pennsylvania star was made in Philadelphia, partly in the Betsy Ross House, and in the very room where that estimable woman constructed the first American flag in 1776; partly in the room at Carpenter's Hall, where the first Continental Congress assembled, and partly in the very chair in Independence Hall in which John Hancock sat when he signed the Declaration of Independence.

The New Jersey star was made in Washington's Headquarters at Morristown; the Maryland star, at Fort Mifflin; the birthplace of "The Star Spangled Banner"; the Virginia star, in the Lafayette Room at Mount Vernon; and the New York star, partly in the Long Room at France's Tavern, where Washington had farewell to his officers after the Revolution, and partly aboard the Flagship New York, Rear Admiral Sampson's vessel in the battle of Santiago.

TRIED TO ROB HUSBAND AS WIFE ASKED, HE SAYS

Dramatic Ending of Trial as Defendant Openly Accuses Woman of Prompting Him to Crime.

Louis Foglia, eighteen years old, of No. 326 East One Hundred and Twenty-sixth Street, was placed on trial before Judge Wadhams in General Sessions to-day for entering the apartment of Paoli Cassamasso, a shoemaker on the ground floor of the same house, on March 12. The shoemaker testified that Foglia had forced an entrance into his bedroom and assaulted him with a blackjack and tried to steal \$600.

Called as a witness for the prosecution, Mrs. Cassamasso refused to recognize Foglia as her husband's assailant, although she testified she was in the room when the burglar entered. She was subjected to a cross-examination, at the end of which Foglia abruptly rose from his seat and announced that he wanted to plead guilty to the crime. "I committed the crime," Foglia told an interpreter, "at the suggestion of Mrs. Cassamasso. She and her husband were continually quarrelling and she gave me \$10 to assault her husband and steal the \$600. She claimed the money belonged to her as much as it did to her husband and she wanted it."

Foglia was remanded for a week.

Huston, one of the owners of the New York American League Club, went to Detroit to-day, where he has been ordered by the War Department to report for examination for entrance into the Engineer Corps of the Army.
