

Women Patriots Enlist For a Hot Summer's Work Helping Out Uncle Sam

Service League Furnishes 250 Members for War Census Labors.

TWO hundred and fifty women, members of the National League for Women's Service, will work for Uncle Sam all through the hot summer compiling and tabulating the returns of New York's war census.

The women are giving their services to the Government in response to a request from Adjutant General Louis W. Stotesbury, through Capt. G. G. Henry, director of the census.

The census act authorizes the Governor to accept contributions, which has been interpreted to mean contributions of labor as well as of money.

THE sacrificial sale held at No. 15 East Fifty-ninth Street by the New York State Woman Suffrage Party has proved such a financial success that it will be continued next week at Castle House, Madison Avenue and Forty-sixth Street.
