**HOSPITAL MENACED BY FIRE; 40 WOMEN AND CHILDREN FLEE**

Many Carried to Safety From Upper Stories of Beth Israel as Stable Burns.

Forty patients, twenty-two of them children, were carried from the fifth and sixth floors of the Beth Israel Hospital to lower floors early to-day

when the building was menaced by a stable fire in the rear. The blaze was in a quantity of hay on the sixth floor of No. 274 Cherry street, and in leaping from windows and through the roof made a glare that lit up the neighborhood. Beth Israel Hospital, at No. 79 Jefferson Street, is separated from the stable building by a ten-foot courtyard. The flames came so near the hospital the night superintendent, Miss Anna Ribertkoss, called into service all the doctors, nurses and orderlies.

The children's ward is on the fifth floor of the hospital, almost flush with the burning floor of the stable. There were twenty-two small patients, and nurses and orderlies carried them all to the floors below. On the floor above the children's ward is the private maternity de-

partment of the hospital, where eighteen women were sleeping. Many of them had to be carried to the lower floors, and the others walked. It did not become necessary to carry any one to the street. The doctors, orderlies and nurses went through all the wards and quieted the 200 or more patients. There was some excitement but no confusion. Then the hospital force assisted the firemen by playing a hose on the hospital roof to keep it from being ignited by sparks.

The fire in the stable was confined to the one floor and did little damage.

**TURKS TREAT ELKUS WELL.**

**Ambassadorial Party Received All Courtesies on Leaving for Bernice.** WASHINGTON, May 31.—Every courtesy was extended to Ambassador Elkus and his party upon leaving Constantinople. Advice coming to-day by way of Stockholm say representatives of the Sultan, the Grand Vizier and the Ministers of Finance and Foreign Affairs said farewell at the station, while a representative of the Minister of Foreign Affairs accompanied the party to the frontier. The party is due at Bernice June 1.

The party includes Ambassador and Mrs. Elkus and three children; the Misses Johnson, Hewes and Tupper and two servants; Secretary B. Cornell Taylor; Second Secretary Oscar I. Milmore; Legal Advisor Arshag K. Schmanvyan; Special Assistant George H. Montgomery, and his family of four; Assistant Secretary Arthur H. Leavitt and family of two; A. Van H. Engert and Samuel Boleman, interpreters, and Frederick Wirth.

**Funeral of Ambassador Guthrie.** PITTSBURGH, Pa., May 31.—The funeral of George W. Guthrie, American Ambassador to Japan, who died at his post in Tokio, took place here to-day. The Japanese Government was represented by Ambassador Sato. The American Government was represented by Breckenridge Long, Third Assistant Secretary of State; Col. Henry H. Ludlow, of the Army, and Capt. Charles B. McVey, of the Navy. The first service was held in the Masonic Temple and church service was held in Calvary Protestant Episcopal Church.

**12 KILLED BY TORNADOES; ONE TOWN IS WIPED OUT**

Forty Also Injured by Storm in Missouri and Southern Illinois.

ST. LOUIS, May 31.—Tornadoes in Missouri and Southern Illinois yesterday caused the death of at least twelve persons and the injury of forty or more, according to advices to-day from the various communities over which the storm passed.

Among the injured were Father Patrick O'Connor and Father Cor-

nellus F. O'Leary of St. Louis, both of whom suffered internal injuries. Mineral Point, Mo., where four persons lost their lives, was wiped out. Losses of life were reported also at Diehlstadt, Mo., and Palmer, Mo., and three negroes perished at Hodges Park, Alexander County, Ill. More than twenty persons were hurt at Mounds, Ill.

**Women Burned in Extinguishing Blaze.**

Awakened early to-day by smoke, Mrs. Christine Stein of No. 319 Bergen Street, Brooklyn, discovered her parlor on fire. With the aid of Mrs. Catherine Burke, the owner of the building, Mrs. Stein smothered the blaze with rugs. Both women were burned, and Mrs. Burke was removed to the Holy Family Hospital. Mrs. Stein had been entertaining visitors in the parlor.

**BIREBUG GETS 21-YEAR TERM**

Klass, Ex-Prescher, Soldier and Subway Guard, is Sentenced. Judge Wadhams in General Sessions to-day sentenced Barnet Klass, a former subway guard, to Sing Sing prison for twenty-one years. Klass was convicted a week ago of arson in the first degree. In imposing sentence Judge Wadhams referred to the fact that Klass had been convicted of desertion from the United States army in 1893 and sentenced to five years, which sentence the President had commuted after Klass had served one year. As a firebug, Klass had five fires to his record. Investigation by Fire Marshal Brophy and Assistant District Attorney Weiser disclosed the fact that Klass, a Hebrew by birth, became a Christian and traveled around the world preaching.
