

# 42 WORLD MEN SERVE COUNTRY AT CALL TO WAR

Flock to Colors to Defend  
America in Her Fight  
for Democracy.

More than thirty men from the various departments of The World and The Evening World are "doing their bit." And this doesn't mean just buying Liberty bonds either, although they have "done their bit" in that too, subscribing more than \$150,000 to the patriotic loan to Uncle Sam. It means that more than thirty men have become members of military organizations and are ready for service "somewhere in France" or anywhere in the world "that the Nation's military chiefs deem it best to send them. These men—there are thirty-nine of them, to be exact—are either in the olive drab of the military arm or the blue of the naval arm some part of every day, drilling, studying, learning to be soldiers or sailors and, from all reports, rendering good account of themselves. before many months have gone by. Some of the men were members of military organizations—before the state of war with Germany was declared, others hastened to enlist at the first intimation that men were needed. And that these might be encouraged all the more to "do their bit" for the Nation, a notice was posted on the bulletin board of every department of The World and The Evening World which said that "any men who may be called into active service in the National Guard, Naval Militia, Army or Navy Reserves, or who may volunteer for service in these organizations, will have the difference between their Federal pay and their World salaries, for the duration of the war, made up to them by The World in every case where their Federal pay is less than their World salaries."

### DEPENDENTS CARED FOR WHILE MEN ARE AT THE FRONT.

Only one other newspaper in this city posted such a notice, it served to set completely at rest the minds of the men who had enlisted or volunteered as to the welfare of their dependents during their term of service. The list of the World men who are subject to the call of the Government for military or naval service ranges from the high rank of Colonel to the arduous duty of the private and comprises thirty-six stiff backs and thirty-six stout hearts.

Reginald L. Foster of the Sunday Department is the Colonel of the Twelfth Infantry, a regiment with which he has seen many years' service, both here at home and on the Mexican border last summer, where he gained his high rank, being a Major when he went to the border with his regiment, Arthur J. McKeogh, also of the Sunday Department, has passed his Plattsburg training camp examinations and is awaiting commission.

In the same department Herb Roth, the artist, is a third class coxswain, and James F. Taylor, a third class quartermaster in the Naval Reserve.

Seven men of The Evening World editorial staff have "signed up" with Uncle Sam. Three are in the Reserve Officers' Training Camp at Plattsburg: Bozeman Bulger, the baseball writer, who has been recommended for the rank of Major; Joseph A. Brady and Gerald C. Smith. The other three are Sergt. Richard F. Freyer of the Quartermaster's Department, Corp. Eugene J. O'Brien of Company B, Seventh Regiment, and Private H. H. McLeilan, also of Company B of the Seventh. James Munday is a private attached to Second Brigade Headquarters in Brooklyn.

### PRESSROOM SENDS MANY MEN INTO THE ARMY.

The greatest number of World men in military organizations from one department is in the pressroom contingent, which has enlisted sixteen. Thomas Madigan is a Second Lieutenant in the Forty-seventh Infantry, Harry Atwood is a Sergeant in the same regiment, and Edward O'Brien, a private. In the Seventy-first Infantry are Corporal James A. Farrell, who is in the machine gun company, and E. Fendleton, both of whom saw service on the border. In the Twenty-third Infantry, which also gave them service in the "late unpleasantness" with Mexico, are Lester Collins, Joseph Morn, Robert Taylor and Lawrence Condon. Two men in the pressroom staff are in the Naval Reserve, Mitchell Hayes and Thomas O'Brien. In the Thirteenth Coast Artillery are Frederick Carlson and John Whelan, and Charles Denan is in the "Fighting Sixty-ninth," and Walter Splith is in the ranks of the Fourth Infantry of New Jersey.

William Ball is in the Fourteenth Infantry and saw service at the border. The World composing room force "goes to the front" with eight men, Edward Leahy, Rudolph Benner and Harry J. Riley in the Second Field Artillery; Edward E. McDonald in the First Field Artillery; Herbert Diller in the Thirteenth Coast Artillery and three men in the Naval Reserve: William H. Moore, a Quartermaster; Jules Johnson, first class printer attached to the Naval Pub-

licity Bureau, and Victor N. Books, fireman, first class. In the accounting department Gerald J. Ednie has become Corporal in the Thirteenth Coast Artillery, and J. S. Callahan is a member of the Seventy-first Regiment. Paul Burdett, of the circulation department, is in the Second Field Artillery, and A. E. Shepard of the classified advertising department is a Captain in the Commissary department of the Twelfth Regiment.

**No Special Permit for Canadian Travel.**

The question was raised by a Canadian steamship company, which said many persons believed they could not go to Canada, under the broad language of the passport order, without specific government permission.


