

POLICE PUZZLED OVER MOTIVE FOR MURDER OF PIPER

Also How and by Whom It
Was Removed From Dr.
Condon's Cellar.

The allegation of the New Brunswick (N. J.) authorities that Dr. William J. Condon, a Captain in the United States Army Medical Reserve Corps, now under arrest at Fort Oglethorpe, Ga., charged with the murder of John Vincent Piper, a Rutgers College student, secreted the body in his home for months started two new investigations to-day.

Friday, the day before the body was discovered, he may have left the train when it had gone a few miles from New Brunswick, doubled back, disposed of the body, and resumed his journey northward. The second was that the body was disposed of by a friend of the physician's after the latter was miles away from the scene.

The roadmakers who found the body are positive that it was not in the field near the Englishtown-Spotswood Road on Friday, as they said they several times crossed the field in which it was discovered later. It is a fact that Dr. Condon reported at Fort Oglethorpe on Saturday.

Dr. Condon's friends assert that it would have been impossible for any one to have kept a body in a cellar as long as the prosecution maintains without its being known, as traces of it would have lingered in the cellar for many days even after it had been removed.

Despatches state that when Dr. Condon was told the charge against him he "got sore and went up in the air," but soon quieted down and refused to discuss the case in any way. He is held in solitary confinement under heavy military guard, and will be turned over to New Jersey officers now on their way there. He has made no effort to engage a lawyer.

The death of Piper has developed into one of the most amazing mysteries the Jersey authorities have had. The puzzling feature is the absence of any known reason for the young man's murder. Coroner Hubbard was given a reason over the telephone, but declares he will not reveal it unless it is proved, as "it would cast dishonor on some one."

ATTACKED IN TAXICAB, GIRL IS FOUND IN PARK

Doctors Find Indications That
She Had Probably Been
Drugged.

In a stupor and with her waist pulled over her head, Ida Ahola, twenty-two years old, a maid living at No. 765 Forty-third Street, Brooklyn, was found at 1 A. M. to-day on the stone steps leading from One Hundred and Sixteenth Street into Morningside Park. Policeman Donohue took her to Knickerbocker Hospital, where she was treated for hysteria.

She told the police yesterday was her day off and she came to Manhattan. She met two men in Sixth Avenue in the afternoon and last night went riding with them in a taxicab. They attacked her, and in the struggle her waist was pulled partly off, but she does not remember leaving the taxi. The doctors said there were indications she had been drugged.

Jumps From Moving Elevator and Is Killed.

Nicholas Kurotski, twenty-two, of No. 266 Cherry Street, attempted to jump

from a moving elevator at No. 56 Franklin Street to-day, missed his footing and was crushed between the car and the flooring, receiving injuries which resulted in his death half an hour later. It took a squad of firemen from trunk No. 1 half an hour to extricate Kurotski from his position. He was employed by the American Buckle Company, a commission merchant, who was on the car with Kurotski, gave the alarm and then fled, screaming from the scene.

On Trial for Auto Disaster.
Howard McConnell, twenty-three years old, of No. 235 Twenty-fifth Street, Guttenberg, N. J., was placed on trial in Hackensack to-day on an indictment charging manslaughter. McConnell went for an automobile ride the night of April 27, accompanied by a party of friends. At Tenafly the car ran into an embankment and overturned. Miss Tessie Green of Jersey City was crushed to death under the heavy car and the three others with McConnell were injured.
