**PLUMB ISLAND
DEAL IS DROPPED
WITH EXPLANATION**

Senator Calder Says Bill Won't Be Pressed in House, but Mystery Is Unsolved.

WASHINGTON, June 29.—That mysteriously accelerated Plumb Island real estate deal is dead. United States Senator Calder killed it to-day with an announcement to The Evening World that the bill he passed through the Senate providing for the transfer by the Federal Government to the City of New York, as part of the Rockaway Fortifications deal, will not be pressed in the House. The island, or that part of it owned by the Government, will remain Federal property. Whatever the big scheme was, and no one outside the inner circle is able to learn the details, it will now be laid on the shelf. Senator Calder read in The Evening World the attack of Representative Fitzgerald of Brooklyn on his bill pending in Congress, and learning that Mayor Mitchell sought to disown it, dictated the following statement: "I have never had any conversation or communication with Mayor Mitchell regarding the transfer of the Plumb Island property to the City of New York, but I have been very much interested in this whole Rockaway project. In the Sixty-third Congress, as a member of the Committee on Fortifications, I brought up the defenseless condition of New York harbor in the

examination of Gen. Weaver, Chief of Artillery, at a hearing before the committee. "It was at my suggestion that the Secretary of War investigated New York's defenses, and on his recommendation the bill authorizing Fort Rockaway was provided for in the first session of the Sixty-fourth Congress, of which I was not a member. "Plumb Island was purchased some years ago for the very purposes for which Rockaway Peninsula is being used, but was found unsuitable for military purposes, and the project was abandoned. "Secretary of War Stimson gave a lease of the property to one Dottler, formerly a Manhattan Alderman, who erected thereon small summer cottages. Dottler had no connection with the Realty Associates, or William M. Greve. I do not know anything about the other part of Plumb Island, excepting I am informed it belongs to the Harkness estate, which I am told has no connection with the Rockaway Pacific Company or the Realty Associates. "Now, as to the relation between Plumb Island and the Rockaway fortification project. Having been interested in New York's defenses, I was anxious that work on the new fort at Rockaway should be expedited. On looking over papers in the case in the office of Gen. Black, Chief of Engineers of the Army at Washington, I discovered that part of the Rockaway transaction involved the dealing of certain rights by the city to the Federal Government. I noted that the Government had made an agreement with the city to deed its land on Plumb Island in exchange for the city's interest in the Rockaway property. Gen. Black informed me that the Secretary of War desired Congress to pass a bill giving him authority to deed this Plumb Island property to New York City. I introduced such a bill, which was indorsed by Secretary of War Baker, and duly passed by the Senate, but has not yet been acted upon in the House. "I recently informed the Attorney General of New York State of this action by the Senate and inquired of him as to the status of negotiations between the city and the Rockaway Pacific Company for acquisition of the fortification property. "The Attorney General's office in New York has advised me that they do not think any further action in the matter at this end is necessary, as they have taken over the land and given the State's deed to the Federal Government, which is now in actual possession. "It would seem to me, therefore, that this statement by the Attorney General's office renders it unnecessary for the House of Representatives to take any action on my bill. My connection with the matter has been solely for the purpose of clearing up complication that threatened to delay the Rockaway fortification project. "The effect of Senator Calder's withdrawal from further connection with the bill means that the Plumb Island trade scheme will pass quietly into the discard. The plan originated with the municipal administration of New York City and not in Washington. It is understood here that some park project was contemplated, of which Plumb Island was to form a part, and private persons were to contribute adjoining property.

Copper Company Makes Big Deal in Coal Fields.
The extensive coal fields of the Victor American Fuel Company located in the Gallup district of New Mexico have been sold to Hayden, Stone & Co. for approximately \$2,000,000, according to an announcement by the purchasing company. The property was purchased for the account of the Ray Consolidated Copper Company, the Chase Copper Company and the American Smelting and Refining Company. A new company has been formed to operate these properties under the name of the Gallop American Coal Company and it will be owned by the above mentioned corporations.

EXCESSIVE AWARDS MADE TO REYNOLDS, IS CHARGE

Bullock Says Realty Man Gets \$412,839 Profit in Marginal Deal and \$208,078 Interest.

William Bullock, director of the Bureau of City Inquiry, issued a statement to-day in which he charged that "excessive awards have been made to William H. Reynolds and others in the condemnation proceedings by the city to acquire property for the South Brooklyn Marginal Railroad."

Stephen C. Baldwin, Edward F. Linton and William L. Moffett, the commissioners of estimate and appraisal, filed their report Thursday of next week, and it was said last night their findings would be made public to-day by the Corporation Council. The Bullock statement says that the awards amount to \$1,555,475.51; the interest to \$73,414.12 and the fee to \$60,000, a total of \$1,678,789.63.

"Loss in taxes makes a grand total cost of more than \$2,000,000," it is added. "For land which cost him \$455,519.48," the statement says, Reynolds is awarded \$858,858.10. He gets a straight profit of \$412,839.92 and \$208,078.25 in interest. The city, therefore, will pay him a total of \$1,074,717.65. On July 20 last Mayor Mitchell, answering a Bureau of City Inquiry report, said Reynolds is a "cut-throat" but his dealings with the city are at arm's length. The fact that Reynolds paid 25 cents a square foot for land for which the city now pays him \$1.00, shows the length of the arm at which Reynolds is held."

"FIGHTING PRIEST" LEADS 3-HOUR BURGLAR HUNT

Father McGrath First Up Stairs After Dropped Bolts of Cloth Gave Alarm.

Father McGrath, the "Fighting Priest," was one of the scores who took part in a burglar hunt early to-day behind, in and on top of Bond Street loft buildings. More than 200 persons from neighboring streets and houses gathered to see the chase, which lasted three hours.

A night watchman heard a thud as he was making his rounds and found a lot of bolts of cloth under a window of the establishment of Sigmund Braunstein on the third floor of No. 22 Bond Street. Police reserves drew a net around the neighborhood and searched high and low. Finally they found a rope dangling from a fire escape on the rear of a Great Jones Street loft that backs up near the Braunstein loft.

A door of the building was forced, and Father McGrath was one of the first up the stairs. Between some packages of goods, on the third floor, they found a man feigning sleep. He described himself as Alexander Fannin, forty-six, a cutter, No. 248 East One Hundred and Third Street, recently of Chicago. He said he had merely gone there to sleep.

Mr. Braunstein said that some of the goods the prisoner was using for a bed were from his establishment. They had been dropped from his window, carried to the rear of the other building and hoisted by the rope to the third floor. About \$1,000 worth of goods had been taken and recovered.
