

HEADLESS MURDER VICTIM'S IDENTITY IS STILL MYSTERY

May Be Louis Pelligrin, Pater-
son Driver, Who "Expected to
Be Killed," and Is Missing.

The Paterson police believe to-day that the headless murder victim found in a vacant lot may be Louis Pelligrin or Charles Majewski of No. 25 Peel Street, Paterson.

These two men have been reported to the police as missing. Pelligrin, according to Detective Captain Tracy, had been employed until last Thursday as a driver by the City of Paterson. He then went to the Street Cleaning office and quit, saying a man was trying to murder him, and that either he or this man would be dead within a few days. If he escaped, Pelligrin said, he intended to return to Italy.

A day or two later Pelligrin was arrested for carrying a revolver and fined \$50. He paid and has not been

soon since. Majewski has been missing since Sept. 27. A theory that the slain man might be Charles M. Stout of Arlington, N. J., who was reported missing after he started on a fishing trip, was dispelled when Stout returned to his home.

The Paterson police have been unable to do anything on the clues found with the body. They are to-day dragging nearby waters in hope of finding the victim's head, but have little hope of success. They think it probable the head was disposed of at some distant point, or possibly destroyed.

One fact only is definitely established. The first report was that it was the body of a youth; it is really the body of a man past thirty. He fought before he died. On his right arm, about 8 inches above the wrist, is a very deep cut as though his murderer had used a hatchet or an axe.

The man was from five feet five inches to five feet six inches in height. He was black haired and from thirty to thirty-five years, well made but not in any sense an outdoor man. He was probably a Latin. The place where the body was found in two sections in the trunk of (Still) District of Paterson, near the silk eye factories that border the Passaic River. The river takes a big outward curve at the foot of the big vacant lot where the body was found. This lot is frequently used as a dumping ground. Being in the neighborhood of factories, it is not a desirable section save at night.

Police and medical authorities agree that when the trunk of the body was found, at about 9 o'clock Monday morning by a factory worker, the man had not been dead more than about eighteen hours.

WESTCHESTER NOTES.

Miss Dorothy Sutton gave a shower at her home, at No. 514 Summit Avenue, Chester Hill, Mount Vernon, yesterday, in honor of Miss Mae De Witt Pauls, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. William C. FEAR FOR SOLDIER SON CAUSES WOMAN'S SUICIDE

Mrs. Neumeier Jumps From Win-
dow—Believed Boy Was Going
to France at Once.

Distracted by fear that her son in the army was to sail for France at once, Mrs. Theresa Neumeier, forty-five years old, left her husband and daughter at the breakfast table in their apartment, at No. 413 East 18th Street, and threw herself from the window to death, six stories below.

Mrs. Neumeier had been under the care of a physician for some time. She was melancholy and depressed. She frequently sought to get near an open window, and this has caused the physician to recommend her removal to an institution. But her husband, Frank Neumeier, and her daughter, Agnes, wanted her to remain at home and underwent to watch her.

Two days ago Mrs. Neumeier told them she had a premonition that her son, Frank Jr., was to go to France at once, and she arose from the breakfast table, saying she was going to get some letters before her husband's daughter could stop her, she raised the window and dived out.
