## COUNT LUXBURG INSANE; HAS BEEN SO FOR YEARS

German Ambassador, Author of "Spurlos Versenkt." Now Interned in the Argentine.

**BUENOS AYRES, Jan. 2.**—Count Luxburg, German Envoy of "spurlos versenkt" (sunk without trace) fame is now insane, and has been "eccentric" for a decade, according to a report to-day of medical authorities who have had him under observation.

The finding was after prolonged and careful study of the German Minister, now held in an internment camp, by a number of reliable medical authorities. The report to-day said their information was that Luxburg had been acting queerly for a number of years.

United Press dispatches several weeks ago reported the belief growing in Buenos Ayres among Germans that the German Minister was a victim of dementia. At that time he was under observation.

## NOTED HYMN WRITER DEAD.

**Mrs. Hawks, Author of "I Need Thee Every Hour," Lived to Be 84.**

**BENNINGTON, Vt., Jan. 2.**—Mrs. Annie Sherwood Hawks, author of many famous Gospel hymns, including "I Need Thee Every Hour," died at her home here to-day at the age of eighty-three.

With the death of the celebrated Fanny Crosby some time ago Mrs. Annie Sherwood Hawks was left as perhaps the last of the noted writers

of the gospel hymns of the past half century.

From her fourteenth year, when her first bit of verse was published in a newspaper in Troy, N. Y., she devoted a large part of her life to the production of hymns. "I Need Thee Every Hour" was translated into more foreign languages than almost any other modern hymn. Among other hymns of which she was the author are: "The Cross for Me," "Good Night," "Why Weeped Thou?" "Who'll Be the Next to Follow Jesus" and "In the Valley."

Hawks was born in Hoozick, N. Y., in 1833 and was educated in the public schools and Troy Seminary. She married Charles Hail Hawks of a New York banking firm and lived in Brooklyn until his death in 1888. Since then she had made her home with her daughter in Bennington, Vt.

## MEXICO MAKES PROTEST AGAINST CROSSING BORDER

But Texas Governor Will Keep Right On in Work of Pursuing Raiders.

**AUSTIN, Tex., Jan. 3.**—The Mexican Government, it was learned here to-day, has protested against American troops crossing into Mexico in pursuit of bandits. The protest is particularly directed at the crossing recently by Texas Rangers and American cavalry at El Indio ranch about ten miles above El Paso.

Gov. Hobby, it was said, has received no advice from Washington relating to the protest and the Texas Rangers at least will continue their activities against Mexican raiders unimpeded by State authorities until Federal authorities instruct otherwise.

## TWO GERMANS ACCUSED AS RUBBER SMUGGLERS

Malitz and Engler Arraigned for Alleged Conspiracy to Aid Kaiser, After Surveillance Since 1916.

**Serjt. Correll of the United States Intelligence Bureau and Lieut. Busby of the Police Department this morning arraigned before United States Commissioner Hitchcock two Germans, Felix Malitz, twenty-two, No. 139 West 70th Street, and Gustave Adolph Engler, twenty-nine, No. 127 West 91th Street, who are charged with conspiracy to smuggle rubber into Germany. The offenses are alleged to have been committed in 1915, and ever since then the men have been watched. Both have been active in the moving picture business and both have applied for naturalization.**

It is charged they arranged for the smuggling of medicinal rubber through the steward of the Norwegian-American liner Kristianiafjord.

In May, 1915, Adolph de Lieuw was arrested and sentenced for trying to sell letters which, he said, Malitz was trying to send to Germany. Malitz was questioned, but was not prosecuted.

## TIE-UP ON BROOKLYN BRIDGE.

**Motor Breakdown on Brighton "1" Stalls Line of Trains.**

New York bound elevated traffic over the Brooklyn Bridge was paralyzed for half an hour this morning by a motor breakdown on a Brighton Beach train. The trouble, which was due to the cold weather, began at the Franklin Avenue Station, and the train was eighteen minutes late reaching the bridge, but it was decided to send it over.

The train stopped on the Brooklyn anchorage of the bridge, and trains of all the Brooklyn elevated roads were strung out in a long line. Passengers were transferred to trolley cars, and the added burden of thousands congested the surface lines. Traffic was resumed at 9:35 o'clock.
