MERCHANTS MAY HELP TO UNTIE TRAFFIC KNOT

Pooling of Their Delivery Facilities for Use in Unloading Freight Is Being Tried by McAdoo.

WASHINGTON, Jan. 9.—Pooling of delivery facilities by mercantile establishments for use in unloading freight is being experimented with here to determine whether commercial trucks and vehicles cannot help to solve the terminal congestion problem. If successful, Director General McAdoo probably will extend the plan throughout the country.

Retail stores are being restricted to one delivery a day, their vehicles being used at other times for hauling freight. It now is proposed that instead of each man hauling for himself, all the facilities be pooled and reasonable cartage charges made to the smaller stores which receive considerable freight but have few trucks.

A freight traffic director for the city probably will be appointed.

SEVEN HURT AS STREET CARS CRASH ON SLIPPERY RAILS

Brakes Fail to Work on Brooklyn Surface Line—One Passenger Suffers Brain Concussion.

Seven persons were hurt, three seriously, in a rear-end collision of two street cars this morning at Bergen Street and Sixth Avenue, Brooklyn. Frank O'Donnell, motorman of the rear car, could not make his brakes work on the slippery tracks, and the cars came violently together.

Both cars were crowded, and passengers on the front platform of the rear car and the rear platform of the front one were injured.

Joseph Grossman, No. 760 Saratoga Avenue, suffered concussion of the brain; John McShane, No. 664 Vanderbilt Avenue, had his left knee-cap broken; and Thomas Fennell, No. 681 Clarkson Avenue, sustained a serious scalp wound. The others who received minor hurts are Abram Maltzoff, No. 219 Howard Avenue; Isidor Feldbau, No. 1330 Pitkin Avenue; Benjamin Kingenberg, No. 174 Paris Place; and Theodore Jackson, No. 126 Utica Avenue.

FEWER PNEUMONIA DEATHS.

Only Fifty-nine in Five Boroughs in Last 24 Hours.

Figures given out by Dr. Charles F. Bolduan, Director of the Bureau of Public Health Education of the Department of Health, show that the number of deaths from pneumonia is decreasing; also the number of deaths from natural causes. At noon to-day the following figures were compiled for the last twenty-four hours as follows:

Deaths in Manhattan from all causes, 126; from pneumonia, 23; in the Bronx, all causes, 42; pneumonia, 8; Brooklyn, all causes, 93; pneumonia, 15; Queens, all causes, 27; pneumonia, 11; Richmond, all causes, 6; pneumonia, 1, making a total of 305 deaths from all causes in the five boroughs and 59 from pneumonia.

JUDGE BARS OUT SCANDAL IN DIVORCE TESTIMONY

Platzek Rebukes Witness Against Woman Whose Lawyer Says She Lost Having Child.

Justice Platzek declared to-day that part 2 of the Supreme Court shall not be a "school for scandal" while he is on the bench.

"This is not a ventilating room for scandal or for the airing of the enmities and jealousies of women," he exclaimed, after the testimony of some of the witnesses for the plaintiff in the action for divorce brought by Albert A. Denivelle against Dorothy C. Denivelle, formerly of Montreal and now living at No. 531 Gravesend Avenue, Brooklyn.

Attorney J. G. Grauer, counsel for the defendant, charged that Denivelle is seeking a divorce because his wife became an invalid in her efforts to save their three-year-old son, Albert Jr., from contracting infantile paralysis. The attorney produced medical testimony to support Mrs. Denivelle's claim that she contracted the disease herself and is now forced to walk on crutches. Denivelle alleges his wife was too friendly with other men.

BRINGS 25,000 BAGS SUGAR.

Cuban Steamer Also Has 48 Passengers—Two Are Detained. With 25,000 bags of sugar and forty-eight passengers, an American steamer arrived at an Atlantic port to-day from Cuba. The vessel was boarded by Federal authorities, who questioned a number of passengers and ordered George Oring and Edward C. Mowinkel, Norwegian engineers, to Ellis Island for further examination.

WHOLESALE SUGAR AT 16 CENTS, IS CHARGE

Food Board Issues Summons for Charles Krafner—Others to Be Called for Hearing.

The Federal Food Board to-day issued a summons for Charles Krafner, a wholesale flour merchant at No. 26 Willett Street. He is accused of selling 600 pounds of granulated sugar at 16 1/2 cents a pound and 912 pounds of brown sugar at 11 cents a pound to the Darling Bread Company of No. 422 Brook Avenue, the next day. Krafner will have a hearing on Friday.

P. A. Johan, head of the board's investigation bureau, said the case was the result of a new investigating system. Two more men accused of sugar profiteering, Ed Berg of No. 165 Avenue A and Nathan Schorchar, are about to come before the board, and before the end of the week twenty subpoenas will be issued, the largest number since the start of Federal food regulation.

The New York Central has notified the Food Board that three carloads of potatoes have not been unloaded because consignees claim the stock is frozen. It was also reported that 8,000 crates of Spanish onions at piers in South Brooklyn and Jersey City are frozen and will have to be destroyed.

LIVINGSTON POLICE DEPUTY.

Lawyer Named to Precede Over Department Trials.

Police Commissioner Hugher to-day announced the appointment of Cambridge Livingston of No. 20 Fifth Avenue as Third Deputy Police Commissioner, whose duty it is to precede over police trials. Mr. Livingston assumed his duties at once and found 125 cases awaiting him.

The new Deputy Commissioner was born in New York City in 1871. He was graduated from Harvard University and later from the law school of Columbia University. He has practiced law for fourteen years with the firms of Platt & Bowers and Choate, Laroque & Mitchell. He is a member of the Knickerbocker and other clubs. In politics he is a Democrat, but is not known as "an organization man."

Bronx Fire Spreads to Five Houses.

Because the fire apparatus could not get up an ice-coated hill in the Bronx to-day the home of Jacob Schunko at No. 3435 Tiemann Street was destroyed and four other two-family houses adjoining were partly burned. Ten families were driven into the street.

Sir Robert Borden Here. Sir Robert Borden, Canadian Premier, arrived in New York to-day on his way to Ottawa, following a two week rest at Hot Springs, Va., where he went following the recent Canadian elections.

COUPLE FOUND DEAD BY GAS FROM DEFECTIVE HEATER

Said They Were Mr. and Mrs. Charles Martin of Plattsburg When They Arrived at Williamsburg.

The Seventh Branch Detective Bureau is seeking to-day to learn the identity of a man and woman found dead in a furnished room in the home of Mrs. Anna Cannon, No. 286 South Fifth Street, Williamsburg.

They arrived at the house last Friday, and said they were Mr. and Mrs. Charles Martin of Plattsburg, N. Y. Last night other boarders told Mrs. Cannon of smelling gas, and she recalled that she had not seen the couple for a whole day. The door was forced by a policeman. Dr. Agria, from the Williamsburg Hospital, said the couple had been dead twelve hours.

Gas was coming from a small heater, which was found to be defective. It is believed the couple were overcome in their sleep. There were no indications of suicide. The man's clothing had labels of a Plattsburg tailor and a card in his pocket bore the name Edward Havenman. The woman was about twenty years old and of dark complexion. She wore some expensive jewelry.
