

THE NEW DORT MODEL.

The Dort Motor Car Company of Flint, Mich., is shipping the new Model 11, the latest development of Dort engineering and body design.

No radical changes are found in the car, although several refinements in design and minor mechanical improvements are noted, each aimed to beautify the lines of the car and simplify operation. The outstanding feature of the Dort chassis is its unusual accessibility.

The body design has been materially improved by changes in the contour of hood and fenders, and there is a cellular type radiator in place of the tube and fin type formerly in use. Westinghouse starting and lighting, Carter Carburetor-Jaco steering gear, coilover springs and Connecticut ignition are among the earmarks of the Dort that give it a high value rating in its class.

BRONX SHOW MODELS.

A tour of the Second Field Artillery at 168th Street and Third Avenue reveals that the Bronx Automobile Show under the auspices of the Bronx Automobile Dealers' Association is up-to-the-minute in every detail and the models shown are the very latest. Some models which were not exhibited at the New York Show in January, owing to railroad congestion, are to be seen at the Bronx display.

THE CHALMERS HOT-SPOT GIVES DEMONSTRATION

The average figures of the recent Chalmers hot-spot week of national demonstration reveal possibilities in this remarkable gasoline remedy, exceeding even the claims of factory engineers.

Figures from certain parts of the South and even including a number of places on the Pacific Coast were not allowed owing to the mildness of the weather. Finally, in order to trim the returns down to the most severe climatic conditions, the returns of the ten coldest States were selected by the committee and the following figures have been released as the Coast-to-Coast average:

Time for first start—7 seconds.
Time to actually start engine—15 seconds.
Maximum acceleration—50 seconds.
Average temperature—2 degrees below zero.
Temperature 100 degrees below zero in each city.
Top speed—15 miles in the open.
Lowest mileage—Average, slightly below factory grade on the coast.

The two best performances were staged at Des Moines, Ia., and Great Falls, Mont. At Des Moines the average temperature for fifteen hours was 12 degrees below zero, and the Chalmers hot-spot started in 5 seconds, and in 30 seconds accelerated to 22 miles per hour. At Great Falls the mercury once touched 12 degrees below zero for an average of 16 hours throughout the test. It took only 8 seconds for the Chalmers hot-spot to sing on all six cylinders, and in 5 additional seconds it was accelerating to maximum power. The fuel analysis in this case showed 54 per cent. gasoline.

BROOKLYN SHOW PLANS.

With a total of seventy-seven exhibitors to date for the Brooklyn Automobile Show, which opens Feb. 23 in the 23d Regiment Armory, Bedford Avenue, Brooklyn, the prospects are bright for an exhibition that will easily equal, if not surpass, all efforts of other seasons.

Thirty-five makes of passenger cars will be displayed during the first week, which is exclusively an exhibit of passenger automobiles, and forty-two makes of business vehicles—motor trucks, delivery wagons and trailers—will be seen during the second period, beginning March 5 and continuing until March 12.

SCHEU AND "KING EIGHT."

The King Car Corporation, local distributors of the "King Eight," has been reorganized with E. A. Scheu succeeding J. D. Porter as general manager. C. B. Rice continues as sales manager.

The new organization will enlarge its sales force and inaugurate a big sales plan covering extensive territory.

Under the new management, the "King Eight" now has very close relations with the factory because, in addition to being local manager, Scheu is also Eastern sales manager for the factory, controlling the entire Atlantic seaboard.

Scheu has had lots of experience in the automobile business. For five years he was with the Packard Company, and for several years with some of the big oil companies. Rice is one of the veterans of the Row and makes a fine teammate for the general manager.

MITCHELL SIMPLICITY.

Simplicity, individuality and good taste are combined in this year's Mitchell line," says President George H. Stone of the Mitchell Company.

"This year the element of performance will be the chief consideration of buyers and in this respect the Mitchell line will invite comparison with any other car.

"The Mitchell policy to manufacture automobiles of power, endurance and stability on reserve lines of economy and efficiency still exists.

"Radical changes in the mechanical construction of the cars are few. The changes in most cases are marked in body design, in interior furnishings and in minor refinements of the chassis, engine or equipment."

SIX HUSKY SENATORS HAVE EYE ON SOCIALISTS

"Vigilantes" at Albany Prepared to Act on Further Display of Anti-War Spirit.

ALBANY, Feb. 12.—A Vigilantes Committee of six members—all men of remarkable physical development—has been organized informally in the Senate to "take care of" the Socialist members whose anti-war activities have excited indignant protests from members representing all parts of the State.

What this committee will do is a matter for speculation. The fact that it is headed by a man who has a son fighting on the French front in the American Army, however, indicates trouble if further attempts are made by any of the ten Socialists to block legislation designed to be helpful to the soldier.

The Socialist members of the Assembly have been preparing a bill making it a crime for the head of any State or city department to demand an oath of allegiance to the Nation and the flag.

400 SHIPYARDS WORKERS ARE OUT ON STRIKE

Fleet Corporation Officials Hope Staten Island Trouble Will End To-Day.

Officials of the Emergency Fleet Corporation spent yesterday trying to settle a strike of carpenters and joiners in the Staten Island shipyards. The men walked out Monday morning without previous warning. Four hundred are still on strike.

From the yards of the Johnson Shipyard Company at Mariner Harbor, 150 men were out. This concern is constructing wooden ships. One hundred men of the Standard Shipbuilding Corporation have stopped work. The third concern affected is the Staten Island Shipbuilding Company. Of its carpenters 150 are out.

At the yards of the Downey Shipbuilding Corporation and of A. C. Brown, it was said, no men were on strike.

All these yards, except the Brown yard, are under direct Government control and the company officials have not had the authority to negotiate for a settlement.

The carpenters were advised that they would have to submit whatever demands they made to the Fleet Corporation, and negotiations for a settlement have been begun. The men of the Staten Island Shipbuilding Company and the Standard Company


