Sunday World Wants Work Wonders

CAPT. M'DONOUGH OF BROOKLYN QUILTS AFTER FURLOUGH

Officer Resigns at Camp Wadsworth "for Business"—Baseball Takes Hold.

(Special to The Evening World.) SPARTANBURG, S. C., Feb. 21.—Capt. Thomas McDonough, Company M, 2d Pioneer Infantry, formerly the 14th New York, has resigned and his resignation has been accepted by the President. The resignation, it is stated, was for

business reasons. Capt. McDonough has been at his home in Brooklyn on furlough for two weeks. Capt. Clyde B. Graham, formerly of the Texas National Guard, to-day was named to fill the vacancy. Spring-like weather of the last ten days has brought the camp baseball teams from their winter quarters and games are played every Wednesday and Saturday half-holidays and on Sundays. There are some famous college baseball players in camp here and almost any regiment in camp can put out a first class team. Only 7 per cent. of the men in Camp Wadsworth have not taken advantage of the Government insurance plan, and a determined effort will be made to get those insured during the extension of time which has been granted. Gen. O'Ryan to-day addressed a circular letter to the men in camp on the subject. Private Frederick C. Benn, Company K, 51st Pioneer Infantry, is transferred to the aviation section, Signal Corps, and ordered to Camp Hancock, Augusta, Ga., for duty. Private Walter G. Hinkley, Com-

pany D, 104th Machine Gun Battalion, is transferred to the Sanitary Corps and ordered to proceed to Astoria, Long Island, reporting to the officer in charge Gas Defense Service. Lieut. Joseph Harrell, 104th Infantry, who was accidentally hurt in a bayonet contest about a month ago, has about recovered and left last night for his home in Brooklyn.

MITCHELL WILL SEEK LICENSE AS ARMY FLYER

Former Mayor Expected at San Diego to Begin Training on Saturday.

SAN DIEGO, CAL., Feb. 21.—Major John Purroy Mitchell, Aviation Section, Signal Officers' Reserve Corps, will arrive here from Waco, Tex., Saturday morning, and on Monday will be put under flight instructions at the Rockwell Field Signal Corps Aviation School. It is Major Mitchell's intention, according to word from the War Department, to attempt to qualify for the rank of reserve military aviator, and his instructor will be Lieut. Robert Malreese of the French Flying Corps, who took active part in the aerial battle around Verdun. In order to attain his reserve military aviator's license, New York's former Mayor must climb out of a field 2,000 feet square and attain 500 feet altitude, keeping all parts of the machine inside the square during the climb; ascend 1,000 feet, kill his motor and land within 500 feet of a designated mark; land over an assumed obstacle ten feet high and come to rest with fifteen hundred feet of it; make one triangular and one straight flight of thirty miles at a minimum altitude of 3,000 feet, and fly for twenty-five minutes at an altitude of 4,000 feet.

WILSON WILL OPPOSE INCREASED WHEAT PRICE

Bills in Congress Would Upset Entire Plans of National Food Administrator Hoover.

WASHINGTON, Dec. 21.—Bills pending in Congress, aimed to increase the price of wheat, will be fought with the full power of the Administration, if necessary, according to an authoritative source to-day. Opposition to the measures, another of which was introduced yesterday by Representative Heilbrunn of Kansas, is based on the ground that their passage would upset the entire wheat and bread programme of the Food Administration, worked out in great detail, and that President Wilson, already has full authority to readjust the price if it is found advisable. One bill in Congress would make the minimum price of wheat \$2.75 a bushel. What is selling now on a basis of \$2.20 a bushel and the price is maintained by heavy Government purchases for the army and navy and for the Allies. In enacting the Food Control Law Congress placed an arbitrary minimum price of \$2 a bushel on next season's crop. This is the price that the bills offered seek to increase.

GEN. BLISS WROTE PAPER PRAISED BY LLOYD GEORGE

Plan of American Army's Chief of Staff Is Called "Irresistible Logic" by Premier.

WASHINGTON, Feb. 21.—Secretary Baker to-day gave Gen. Bliss, American representative on the Supreme War Council, credit for drafting the document Premier Lloyd George referred to Tuesday as having played such an important part in the proceedings of the council at its meeting at Versailles. The American argument in favor of single control was the one which the Premier said "was presented with irresistible power and logic" and was "one of the ablest documents ever submitted to a military conference."

OBITUARY NOTES.

Crimmond Kennedy, once famous as a constitutional lawyer, is dead in Washington and aged seventy-five. Col. John Murphy, Confederate veteran and one of the best known hotel men in the country, is dead at Richmond, Va. Thomas E. Kennedy, a messenger in the Corporation Counsel's office for thirty-four years, died yesterday at his home, No. 41 Christopher Street, aged seventy-four. Dr. George C. S. Southworth, formerly professor of English and literature at Kenyon College, Gambier, O., and later at the Case School of Applied Science in Cleveland, is dead at Springfield, Mass., aged seventy-two. Frank D. Cadmus, once a well known athlete and member of the old Staten Island Athletic Club, died yesterday at his home at Great Kills, aged fifty. Capt. John F. Gallagher, retired of the New York Police, died yesterday at his home at Mount Vernon, aged seventy-three. Albert A. Gulques, retired Newark leather manufacturer, died yesterday at his home at Fair Haven, N. J., aged sixty-two. Charles P. Harrison, for twenty years an ice dealer in the Oranges, died yesterday at his home at Orange. John I. Wernig, a musician, is dead at his home, No. 439 Hancock street, Brooklyn, aged eighty-four. He was for many years leader of the Newark treatment band and also of Glenside band. Brother Augustine, who was Edward Flynn before he entered the order of St. Francis, is dead at St. Francis Hospital, No. 41 Butler Street, Brooklyn, aged seventy-three. Myles J. Gallagher, fifty, a member of the editorial department of the Evening Digest, died of pneumonia yesterday at his home at Harrison, N. J.

WOMEN GIVING PEARLS TO GREAT WAR NECKLACE

Historic Jewel Is Being Brought Together by Committee of British Red Cross.

LONDON, Feb. 21.—Great interest has been aroused, says the Times, by the announcement that a historic pearl necklace, made up of single beautiful pearls, given by women

who have strings and ropes of pearls, is now being brought together by the Collections Committee of the British Red Cross. It is believed by the originator of the idea that this Red Cross pearl necklace will string together beautiful pearls freely given by women of all the overseas dominions and many Allied countries. It is intended to have a Golden Book of the women who give one pearl or more to the war necklace, in which each name shall be printed, and this book will be presented to the Imperial War Museum as a record of this special effort on the part of the women of the British Empire and the Allied countries.
