

U. S. COURTS POWERLESS IN ELECTION FRAUD CASES

WASHINGTON, March 4.—Federal Courts have no jurisdiction over bribery at general elections for the selection of Federal officers, the Supreme Court decided today in upholding decrees sustaining demurrers to indictments in the Cincinnati election fraud case.

97 DEATHS FROM PNEUMONIA.

Total for Last 48 Hours Exceeds That of One Week Ago. There were ninety-seven deaths from pneumonia out of a total of 383 deaths from all causes during the period from noon Saturday to noon to-day, according to figures issued by the Department of Health as follows:

CLEARING HOUSE FOR RECRUITING IS OPENED HERE

Army, Navy and Marine Officers at Headquarters to Place Men Where Best Fitted. The day when the patriotically inclined young man had to run all over the city to find out which branch of Uncle Sam's service he was best fitted for has passed.

Through the efforts of the Recruiting Committee of the Mayor's Committee on National Defense, the eligible man with a notion may obtain the other half by applying at the Central Recruiting Headquarters, which opened today on the sixth floor of the Hall of Records, Chambers and Centre Streets, Room No. 615.

Army, navy and marine corps recruiting officers are on hand and ready with information on all three arms of the service and all of their branches.

Henry MacDonald, director general of the committee, was on hand to watch the opening of the headquarters and declared that members of his recruiting committee as well as the army and navy representatives are ready to answer all questions with regard to enlistments and the draft.

Edward B. Cochems is secretary of the recruiting committee and he is ably seconded by D. A. Healy, who is responsible for the idea which established the headquarters. Sergeant John H. Hauck, with eighteen years of army service and wearing the Philippine service bar, is looking after the army applicants while a petty officer, formerly stationed at the navy recruiting station at No. 34 East 23d Street, looks after those who prefer the ocean fighting.

Shipbuilders are eagerly sought by the Government at this time, and they too may apply to Mr. Healy. At the present time recruiting for the Marine Corps is closed, but will be reopened within a short while.

The navy needs electricians, general electricians and radio operators, who will be given a course of training at the electrical school in the New York Navy Yard; also apprentice seamen, firemen and landmen as mechanics' mates, who will be sent to the aviation school at Pensacola, Fla.

The first enlistments recorded at the new office were two brothers, Frank R. and James L. Rodgers, of No. 1229 East 37th Street, Brooklyn, who were accepted in the navy as apprentice seamen.
