DOCTOR'S SKULL BROKEN IN HOLD-UP BY "PATIENTS"

Attacked and Robbed When He Answers Emergency Call From Apartment.

Dr. Josef Saxl of No. 224 East 72d Street, is suffering from a fractured skull as a result of a recent encounter with hold-up men. A week ago Dr. Saxl received by phone an emergency call, urging him to come to an apartment at No. 227 East 72d Street. As he rang the bell three men closed in on him.

One pressed a revolver against his abdomen and ordered him to throw up his hands. Dr. Saxl caught the wrist of the menacing hand and twisted the weapon away from it. Then the other men beat him with black jacks until he lost consciousness.

His groans attracted other dwellers in the house and he was removed to a hospital. His pockets had been rifled. Other doctors have been similarly held up recently.

LEVER SEES BREAD CARDS.

WASHINGTON, March 28.—The House, after another day of debate, again failed to reach a vote on the bill to appropriate \$10,000,000 to assist farmers to purchase seed grains and to foster mobilization of labor in the grain States.

Chairman Lever of the Agriculture Committee, in charge of the bill, warned the House that failure to enact the measure would be a blow at the American soldiers in France and might involve bread lines in our cities next year. "We are not many months away from bread cards," he added.
