RESERVE BOARD WARNS OF EFFECT OF WAR ON TRADE

Radical Readjustment in All Business Coming, Says Annual Report.

WASHINGTON, May 2.—Warning of impending radical readjustment in all business as a result of America's growing participation in the great war marked the annual report of the Federal Reserve Board today.

The war's progress, it says—whether in favor of the United States or the enemy—will reflect directly on the country's assets and create feverish conditions in the commercial world.

In its effort to counteract any sudden changes in business activity the Federal Reserve system has put forward the general policy of maintaining a strong liquid character of assets, the report points out. Our belligerency is due to revolutionize commercial conditions in the future exactly as it has done in the past, hence any falling off in our exports with the resultant demand for increased quantities of gold again will force heavy calls for ready money.

Notwithstanding the unprecedented expansion, resources of the twelve Federal Reserve banks increased \$2,226,463,000 in the year prior to Dec. 30, 1917, covered by the report. The tremendous gain was about evenly distributed, according to the ratio of reserve capital in each district, showing a generally satisfactory condition through all parts of the country. Total resources at the close of 1917 were \$3,089,945,000 against \$169,482,000 on Dec. 30, 1916.

Due to the policy of gold conservation the board ordered withdrawal from circulation nearly \$1,000,000,000 of gold. The gold was filled with an unusual issue of Federal Reserve notes. Federal Reserve notes in circulation at the close of 1917 aggregated \$1,246,912,000. On Dec. 30, 1916, Federal Reserve notes in actual circulation totaled \$274,125,000.

Net deposits of the twelve banks increased \$402,042,000 last year. The figures for the two years are: Dec. 30, 1917, \$1,457,984,000; Dec. 30, 1916, \$654,912,000. Combined net earnings for the year, the board reports, were \$1,202,000, an average of 18 1/2 per cent. on an average aggregate capital of \$69,200,000. Of this sum the New York district earned more than one-third or \$7,718,355.

HOLD THREE FOR VIOLATION OF RUBBER EMBARGO LAW

trio Charged With Conspiracy in Not Obtaining Licenses for Buenos Ayres Shipments.

On a complaint charging them with engaging in a conspiracy to violate the rubber embargo law and President Wilson's proclamation, made by a member of the Naval Intelligence Division, James W. Ware, Paul Gottlieb and Richard L. Decker were today arraigned before United States Commissioner Hitchcock. They waived examination and were held in \$2,000 bail each to await action of the Federal Grand Jury. Two others accused in the complaint have not been apprehended. The complaint charges the conspiracy was formed in this district on Oct. 15 last, and in furtherance of it the defendants caused a large quantity of rubber goods to be stored at No. 29 Washington street, preliminary to its being shipped to Buenos Ayres. It is alleged that no application for an export license was made by the defendants in connection with the rubber goods they had obtained from unknown parties.

Report in Favor of State Control of Liquor Traffic.

LONDON, May 2.—The English, Scotch and Irish committees appointed to investigate the purchase and control by the State of the liquor traffic have reported in favor of the feasibility of the scheme. The cost is estimated at more than £10,000,000, but less than £500,000,000.

40 HOUSES BURN IN HOUR IN THREE RIVERS, QUE., FIRE

Blaze Starting in Theatre Beyond Control and Help is Called From Quebec and Montreal.

THREE RIVERS, Quebec, May 2.—Fire in the business section here today quickly destroyed stores and residences and got the better of the local fire-fighting force. Help was called from Quebec and Montreal.

In an hour forty houses on Bonaventure street, the main business thoroughfare, had been destroyed. The flames spread to the nearby streets and the families were compelled to leave their houses because of the tremendous heat.

The fire is reported to have started in the Victoria Theatre, which collapsed. Three Rivers, an industrial and manufacturing city of about 10,000 population and a part of the City of Quebec, it was visited by a disastrous fire in 1906, when half the city was burned.

The telephone company notified the reserve several days ago that the headquarters, No. 218 West 86th Street, was now in the territory of the "circle" exchange and that the telephone number, "Columbus 1492," would have to be changed.

To back up the boys, Edward Odham, Executive Secretary of the reserve, yesterday called on F. H. Bethell, Vice President of the telephone company, to enlist his aid in keeping the old number.
