

BARONESS IS SENT TO ELLIS ISLAND; CASE A MYSTERY

Madame de Seidlitz, the Well Known Writer, Now "Guest" at Detention Camp.

Baroness Ranck de Seidlitz, owner of a 40,000 acre estate in Russia and formerly possessed of a large income from cotton mills in Finland, has been on Ellis Island for the last week. The authorities there refused to divulge the reason for her stay as a "guest" of the Immigration Department.

As the author of a bright play presented recently by the Washington Square Players, the Baroness de Seidlitz won the plaudits of many literary persons in the Greenwich Village colony, but her serious articles upon Russian and German questions brought to her far more praise.

Adding mystery to her being on Ellis Island is the fact that prior to her moving from a studio at No. 11 West 20th Street, several men, who said they were Government agents, called there and examined her papers. "All I will say is that the Baroness de Seidlitz is on Ellis Island at present and that no information regarding her will be given out," was the statement made by Byron Uhl, Deputy Commissioner of Immigration.

At No. 11 West 20th Street it was said that the Baroness kept two stenographers very busy writing articles she dictated, but that her interests extended also to commissions upon supplies sent to France of late. Many of her friends were French. One acquaintance said the Baroness remarked to her once that she was taken for a German sometimes because of her name.

WOULD RETURN KAISER'S GIFT IN FORM OF BULLETS

London Art Critic Wants Statue in Front of Kensington Palace Made Into Projectiles.

LONDON, May 23.—M. H. Spielmann, a noted art critic, protests against the statue of William III., presented by the Kaiser to the British nation eleven years ago, being allowed to remain in front of Kensington Palace. He suggests that it be returned to the donor either in projectile form or in some manner equally appropriate.

KINGDON GOULD WINS COMMISSION QUICKLY IN NEW NATIONAL ARMY

Made First Lieutenant in Interpreters' Corps Because of His Knowledge of Languages.

CAMP DIX, N. J., May 23.—Despite the fact that he recently declined an appointment to the division officers' training camp, with its opportunity to win a commission, Kingdon Gould, who has been on duty with the 78th Division Intelligence Department several months, has been promoted by a War Department order to the rank of First Lieutenant in the Interpreters' Corps.

From private, Gould has risen to the rank of Battalion Sergeant Major of the headquarters troop.

Gould was at once recognized by division officers as valuable for the Interpreters' Corps. He speaks five and can read and write seven foreign languages.

MRS. TROWBRIDGE CHOSEN FOR MRS. BROWN'S PLACE

Succeeds Clubwoman Now Seeking Reno Divorce in Defense Council Office.

Mrs. Alexander Trowbridge, formerly State Chairman of the National League for Woman's Service, was elected Chairman of the New York State Division of the Women's Section, Council of National Defense, yesterday afternoon at a meeting in the Hotel Astor. Mrs. Trowbridge succeeds Mrs. William Grant Brown, who at present is in Reno, seeking a divorce. She is still President of the New York State Federation of Women's Clubs, but resigned her National Defense Chairmanship at the meeting on April 17. Her letter of resignation, which merely said she could no longer fill the position, was read at yesterday's meeting.

CENT DAMAGES FOR EYRE.

Verdict in Slander Suit Against Philadelphia Collector.
PHILADELPHIA, Pa., May 23.—State Senator T. Larry Eyre was awarded one cent damages in his \$50,000 slander suit against William H. Berry, Collector of the Port of Philadelphia. Berry, in a campaign speech last fall, charged Eyre with having accepted "graft money" in connection with the erection of the Pennsylvania Capitol at Harrisburg.

POGROMS IN GALICIA.

Many Jews Wounded and Shops Plundered at Vieltza.
STOCKHOLM, May 23.—Pogroms have taken place at Vieltza, Galicia, and many Jews have been wounded seriously, according to a report received by the Jewish Press Bureau here. Shops were plundered and windows smashed. The damage to the grocery store exceeded 1,000,000 kroner. The local police made no effort to protect the Jews and military assistance was summoned from Cracow.

County Judge Young of Westchester today sentenced William J.
