

"AIN'T IN COURT WITH BABY.

Mother of Seven Stricken When Husband is Sent to Prison.
When Judge May, in the Brooklyn County Court to-day, sentenced John Belliere, convicted of manslaughter in the first degree, to Sing Sing for six to twelve years, his wife, the mother of seven children, with a baby in her arms, fell to the floor in a faint.
"God have mercy on my children!" she cried after she had been revived, "what is to become of them now?"
Belliere collapsed when leaving the courtroom and had to be carried out by attendants. A brother, Salvatore, is linked with him in the charge of murdering John Sanna in a quarrel over a card game last February.

LANSING REVEALS BERNSTORFF PLOT AGAINST AMERICA

Envoy Knew Germany Would Resume U Boat Atrocities After It Gave Pledge.

SCHENECTADY, N. Y., June 10.—"Prussianism and the idea of enduring peace among nations can never be brought into harmony; compromise cannot even be considered," Robert Lansing, Secretary of State, declared here to-day in an address as honorary chancellor of Union College for 1918.

Instances after instances from his own experience at the head of America's Foreign Office were cited to prove his point, because, he asserted, "Americans, even those intellectually equipped, have but vague ideas of the attitude which made Prussianism possible."

"It is a fact not generally known," said Secretary Lansing, "that within six weeks after the Imperial Government had, in the case of the Sussex, given this Government its solemn promise that it would cease ruthless slaughter upon the high seas Count von Bernstorff, appreciating the worthlessness of the promise, asked the Berlin Foreign Office to advise him in ample time before the campaign of submarine murder was renewed in order that he might notify the German merchant ships in American harbors to destroy their machinery, because he anticipated that the renewal of that method of warfare would in all probability bring the United States into the war."

"How well the Ambassador knew the character of his government and how perfectly frank he was! He asked for the information without apology or indirection. The very bluntness of his message shows he was sure his superiors would not take offense at the assumption that their word was valueless and had only been given to gain time and that, when an increase of Germany's submarine fleet warranted, the promise would be broken without hesitation or compunction."

"What a commentary on Bernstorff's estimate of the sense of honor and good faith of his government! 'In view of this spirit of hypocrisy and bad faith, manifesting an entire lack of conscience, we ought not to be astonished that the Berlin Foreign Office never permitted a promise or a treaty engagement to stand in the way of a course of action which the German Government deemed expedient. I need not cite as proof of this fact the flagrant violations of the treaty neutralizing Belgium and the recent treaty of Brest-Litovsk."

"This discreditable characteristic of German foreign policy was accepted by German diplomats as a matter of course and as a natural, if not a praiseworthy, method of dealing with other governments."
The cause of the war, Mr. Lansing said, was simply the German desire for world dominion.
"That was and is the central thought of Prussianism," he said. "It excited the cupidity of the governing and wealthy classes of the Empire. It dazzled with its anticipated glories and by its promise of a boasted racial su-

periority the German millions who were to be the instrument of achievement. With a devotion and zeal worthy of a better cause they turned their energy into those channels which would aid the ruling class.

"We must go on with the war. There is no other way. This task must not be left half done. We must not transmit to posterity a legacy of blood and misery. We may in this great conflict go down into the Valley of the Shadow because our foe is powerful and injured to war.

"We must be prepared to meet disappointment and temporary reverses, but we must, with American spirit, rise above them. With courageous hearts we must go forward until this war is won."

A military atmosphere pervaded the commencement ceremonies. Secretary Lansing and Gen. Peyton C. March, Chief of Staff of the Army, recipients of the honorary degree of Doctor of Laws, were escorted from President Richmond's residence to the First Presbyterian Church, where the exercises were held, by more than 1,000 soldiers of the Second and Tenth Regiments of the New York Guard. Thirty-seven members of the graduating class were absent on account of military duties.

Frederick Putnam Bellamy of Brooklyn, a member of the Class of 1888, received the honorary degree of Master of Arts.

WOMAN IS KILLED BY AUTOMOBILE IN SIGHT OF HER SON

Youth Came to Meet Her With Letter From Another Son in France.

While her son stood waiting on an opposite curb at 20th Street and Seventh Avenue to-day with a letter in his hand from another son in France, which he was anxious for his mother to read, an automobile rounding the corner from 20th Street struck Mrs. Mary Connelly, fifty-five years old, of No. 219 West 20th Street. She died fifteen minutes later in her son's arms in a nearby store.

The accident occurred when Mrs. Connelly was returning to her home after her morning shopping. During her absence a letter came from her soldier boy, Daniel, in France, and Peter, another son, went to the corner to meet her. The boy in France had written that he was well and expected to be home shortly.

In his excitement to rush to his mother's assistance Peter dropped the letter and it was lost.
The chauffeur, Frank Whilm, nineteen, of No. 733 Seneca Avenue,

Brooklyn, who was driving a car belonging to the Economy Towel Company of No. 39 Park Place, was arrested.

According to the police the woman saw the car approaching and she hesitated, as did the driver, for a second, and then they both started ahead together and the woman was struck with such force that she was knocked fifteen feet.

There was considerable excitement in the neighborhood over the accident as Mrs. Connelly had been a resident of that section more than forty years. Her husband is engaged in the express business.
