**MANY THEATRICAL FOLK AT ANNA HELD FUNERAL**

Body of Actress Will Be Buried in France After the War, as She Wished.  
Hundreds of theatrical personages attended the funeral of Anna Held, the actress, at Campbell's Funeral Parlor, No. 1270 Broadway. More than 2,000 friends have viewed the body since Monday night. Miss Held died Monday afternoon from bron-

chial pneumonia, after being ill for several months suffering with pernicious anemia.  
Miss Lillian Russell and Miss Lane Carter, the daughter of Miss Held, represented the family at the funeral. Rev. Robert Brown of the French Catholic Church of this city read a Catholic mass in Latin and offered prayer. The honorary pall-bearers were Gene Buck, Gus Edwards, Charles Evans and John Slocum.  
It was Miss Held's wish that her body be buried in France. Acting on this desire the body was taken to Woodlawn Cemetery, where it will remain in a vault for the duration of the war, when it will be taken to France.  
Among the scores of floral wreaths was one with a card marked "Flo." It came from Florens Ziegfeld, Miss Held's former husband.

**TIRED OF BEING WHIPPED.**

Reason Given by Boys Who Escaped From Dobb's Ferry Asylum.  
"We got tired of being whipped," said sixteen-year-old Charles Engleason in the Yonkers City Court to-day. He and two other boys, August Koehliert and John Nemeck, were arraigned for escaping from the Dobb's Ferry Juvenile Asylum. They had had let themselves down from a second-story window with a rope made of sheets, and walked five miles in their night clothes to Robinson's Farm, Yonkers, where they got some clothes just before they were arrested.  
Superintendent Guy Morgan of the asylum admitted that the boys were chastised now and then with a strap, but said it was never done cruelly. The court sent the boys back to the asylum. A fourth boy, Herbert Van Duane, had escaped at the same time, 1 o'clock yesterday morning, and he has not yet been caught.

**GOMPERS AGAINST WORK OR FIGHT DRAFT PROVISION**

Writes Military Committee Enactment of Clause Would Injure Production.

WASHINGTON, Aug. 14.—Organized labor's emphatic opposition to any work or fight provision in the new war-power bill extending the draft ages is expressed in a letter from Samuel Gompers, President of the American Federation of Labor, received to-day by members of the Senate Military Affairs Committee.  
The letter referred particularly to an amendment proposed by Senator Thomas of Colorado, proposing to withdraw deferred classification given for industrial reasons where men were absent from their work for more than five days without cause. The provision, as added to the bill by the committee, has a modification by Senator Reed of Missouri, eliminating the five-day limit.  
Mr. Gompers wrote: "In my judgment, no measure could be enacted with more injurious consequences to continuous production than such a measure. The workmen in the United States are doing their full share of service and duty. They are wholeheartedly supporting the war programme; they are giving themselves, their sons, their brothers and other blood relations on the firing line. They are producing more per man and more to the aggregate than any man or group of men in any other country on the face of the globe."  
"There may be one or a few who may have failed to perform their duty, but I submit to your serious consideration whether if a bill were enacted into law which left the workers of our country as a reflection upon their service and their loyalty whether it would not create a reaction most unfavorable to our common purpose in service and in winning the war."

**SEARCH FAILS TO FIND MAN WHO DISAPPEARED FROM SOUND STEAMER**

A wide search has failed to shed any light on the mystery surrounding the disappearance of Frank B. Lockton of Pearl River, N. Y., who for nearly fifteen years was connected with the Dexter Folder Company of No. 200 Fifth Avenue, this city.

A stateroom on the sound steamer Priscilla, believed to have been occupied by Lockton on the night of Aug. 7, was found empty when the boat ended its trip here. His bags and baggage were intact and a search of hospitals and morgues has developed nothing.

Lockton was thirty-eight, five feet nine inches tall, had dark brown hair and mustache. His wife has closed her home at Pearl River and is now stopping at No. 801 Washington Street, Hoboken, N. J.

**LUCIEN L. BONHEUR DIES.**

He Was Founder of the French Theatre in New York City.

After an illness of almost two years Lucien L. Bonheur died early this morning at Great Neck, L. I., according to an announcement made to-day. He was fifty-four years old, was born in France and came to America 20 years ago. He was a cousin of Rosa Bonheur, the painter.

Mr. Bonheur was founder of the French Theatre in New York, former general manager of the Alliance Francaise, founder of the Young Folks League of Montefiore Home and former President of the French Dramatic Circle. He was a member of the Friars and the Republican clubs. He was decorated a number of times by the French Government for various achievements.

**HAD BAD RECORDS, IS CLAIM.**

Reason Given for Dismissal of Motormen Belonging to Union.

Examiners John Henderson and C. H. Osburn of the Industrial War Labor Board to-day heard further testimony in the complaint of eighteen discharged union motormen against the New York Consolidated Railroad Company. The hearing is being held in the Federal Building.

William H. Smith, acting Chairman of a committee of Brotherhood of Locomotive Engineers, Division No. 412, declared that at a conference his committee had with Vice President Dempsey of the railroad on July 24, a demand was made for reinstatement of motormen discriminated against, and further that elevated and subway motormen be allowed to join organized labor. The records of the men were bad, the committee was told, he said, and that was given as cause for their dismissal.

**Soldier About to Sail is Held for Murder.**

AN ATLANTIC PORT, Aug. 14.—

Lock Montgomery, a soldier with a division about to sail for France, is held to-day for the authorities of Lee City, Ky., on the charge of murder. Police officers say he confessed yesterday that he killed Bruce Lewis in a street fight at Lee City, March 8, 1916. A telegram to Lee City brought word that the man was wanted.

**Standing Room Only in Atlanta Penitentiary.**

Because of the crowded condition of the United States Penitentiary at Atlanta, Judge Mayer in the Federal District Court, at the suggestion of Attorney General Gregory, has designated the Maryland State Penitentiary as the place of confinement for all male prisoners hereafter sentenced for terms of more than one year.

**Barge Load of Sugar on Fire.**

Fire broke out this morning in a barge load of sugar at the French Line pier, 44th Street and North River, and a still alarm brought Engine Company No. 2 and Truck Company No. 21. The flames were confined to the forward bulkhead and the damage was slight. The barge is the property of the Lee Lighterage Company, and the sugar is consigned to the French Government.


