THE face and neck are usually the first portions of the body to show signs of wasting tissue and departing youth...

To have fish firm it should be cooked in salted water. A little vinegar diluted with this will impart a delicious flavor to the fish.

Roll sausages in flour before frying them and they will not burst open. The flavor will also be improved.

When potting the plants for winter mix a little powdered tobacco with the soil in each pot and you will not be annoyed by worms ruining the plant.

Washing combs often injures the color. A good way to clean them is to use a small brush and by pulling a piece of cotton through the teeth...

If your suede shoes become shabby looking rub the soles and shiny spots with fine sandpaper.

An excellent furniture polish is made of one part turpentine to three parts linseed oil. It is not necessary to use a large quantity of polish in cleaning furniture.

For cleansing the bathroom tiling use salt. This will keep the tiles bright and clean.


Point stains, even of long standing, can be removed by applying equal parts of turpentine and ammonia. Saturate the spot a few times with the mixture and wash out in soap suds.





The LIFE of General PERSHING

America Drops the Plowshare To Take Up the Sword Under Pershing's Lead

By July 20, 1917, Gen. Pershing had arranged with the Government at Washington to provide a regular trans-Atlantic transport service for provisioning and bringing general war supplies to the American Expeditionary Force.

Thus the United States was to supply all the food for the troops. There was a world shortage in food in the summer and fall of 1917. The enormous armies maintained by the Allies had made a stupendous drain upon all kinds of foodstuffs.

France into the front-line trenches, but he knew that he must undergo a special training himself in order to be fitted to lead them properly when the time came.

Every moment that could be spared from his organization work he spent at the front observing the tremendous operations of the opposing armies. The first of these visits to the front was on June 20, 1917, when he visited Sir Douglas Haig, the British commander-in-chief.

Under the provisions of the act that created Pershing a General, all commanders of units larger than a division in the field will have the rank of Lieutenant General, as is customary in the European armies.

With the elevation of Gen. Pershing, the only officers superior to him on the front were Field Marshal Petain and Sir Douglas Haig.

The trenches were found to be extremely muddy, but of excellent construction. The Americans settled down to their new quarters, and at daylight got their first view of the German lines stretching away for miles under the dripping clouds.

Under cover of darkness these troops marched from the little village where they had been quartered—themselves nearly under the fire of the enemy—through roads nearly impassable with deep, sticky mud.

On Nov. 5, however, the Germans appeared to have learned that Americans were occupying the sector opposite the front line. The flash-light of a French officer revealed that here were the long expected Americans, and soft greetings of "Vive l'Amérique" came from the position who forgot their weariness at the sight.
