**PAY RISE GRANTED
40,000 LABORERS
ON WATER FRONTS**

Longshoremen and Others Also Get Eight Hour Day and Saturday Half Holiday.

The National Adjustment Commission, composed of T. V. O'Connor, representing the International Longshoremen's Association; representatives of the steamship lines and the Federal Government has granted substantial wage increases to deep water

longshoremen, coastwise longshoremen, cargo repairers and checkers. This increase affects 40,000 laborers on the Atlantic Coast from Norfolk to Philadelphia.
The ruling dates from Oct. 1, 1918, and is effective to Sept. 30, 1919.
Deep water longshoremen are granted an increase from 50 cents to 65 cents an hour, with \$1 an hour for all overtime. They also get an eight-hour day instead of nine.
Cargo repairers and coastwise longshoremen are granted the same increase as deep water longshoremen.
Checkers, who formerly received \$3.75 per day and worked nine hours, are to receive a flat rate of \$5 for eight hours. A Saturday half holiday is also granted to all workers.
Separate unions will meet to-night to ratify the awards.

POLITICAL NOTES

Alfred E. Smith, Democratic candidate for Governor, is due to return to-day from Washington, after a conference with President Wilson at the President's invitation. Despatches from Washington say that the chief executive was much impressed with the treaty candidate, whom he met for the first time. Among the matters discussed were the food situation, child labor and the Barge Canal.
In the absence of anything definite in the way of news or reports, Republican leaders are filing the gaps with predictions of a plurality for Gov. Whitman of from 200,000 to 250,000 votes.
State Chairman Harris of the Democratic Committee, has evinced no desire to call a meeting of the Committee to name a successor to himself. His friends argue that in view of his expunction of the charges against him and his withdrawal from the campaign.

no attempt will be made to supplant him. Further, they say, it would be a hardship to call together the 150 committee members who are engaged in all parts of the State in the sale of Liberty Loan bonds.
Gov. Whitman is to speak to-day and to-morrow at Watertown, Potsdam and Plattsburg. He will go South on Monday, and during the week will be heard at Fort Henry, Ticonderoga, Troy, Buffalo, Binghamton, Auburn and Seneca Falls.
Gov. Whitman is quoted as saying that he will not appoint a successor to Superintendent of Prisons, George M. Carter, until after election. He says that the position is a difficult one to fill and that he is not going to hurry. George W. Franklin, Deputy State Superintendent, will act as the Superintendent in the interim.

The quiet wedding took place recently "somewhere in Maryland," the bride announced.

Secretary Wilson to Speak Here.
Secretary of Labor William B. Wilson will be the guest of honor and principal speaker at the meeting of the Humanitarian Club next Sunday afternoon at 2:30 o'clock at the Hippodrome. A Liberty Loan drive will be made after Secretary Wilson's speech, and Misha Appelbaum, leader of the club, will speak on "Bondage or Liberty."

Convicted of Charity Swindle.
SAN FRANCISCO, Oct. 4.—J. J. Worthington and Mrs. Eas Belmont were found guilty last night in the Federal Court of conspiracy and using the mails

to defraud in connection with an alleged extensive charity swindle. Worthington's operations in San Francisco and Los Angeles netted him \$100,000. He formerly operated in the East.
