## ALTAR OF LIBERTY MAY BE ENDURING SHRINE OF VICTORY

Plans to Embody It in Permanent Arch Made After City Pays Homage There.

A meeting will be held in the near future at the National Sculpture Society, to discuss ways and means to embody the Altar of Liberty into a permanent "Victory Arch" that will remain, for all time, as a monument to America's part in the war. The artists of this society have the same idea in mind that inspired the great crowd which all "Victory Day" and far into the night, on that wonderful November eleventh, destined to go down into history as one of America's greatest days of celebration, surged and cheered in front of the little altar that had been erected to represent the very heart of the great drive for the Fourth Liberty Loan—the Altar of Liberty in Madison Square Park.

"Wait!" exclaimed the impromptu speaker, as he waved an effigy of the ex-Kaiser in the face of his listeners. "Wait. Three groans for the master criminal."

The groans were given with a will, amid yells of derision and cat calls. The man on the platform threw the stuffed dummy to hundreds of waiting hands and in a moment it was torn to shreds.

"My children," the speaker continued, holding out his hands for silence or as near silence as was possible in that hour of bedlam, "you are standing before the Altar of Liberty, the liberty you fought for with your guns or with your dollars, and you have gained what you sought. A cheer now for the United States of America."

For a moment even the whistles, the bells and the horns and rattles were drowned out in the cheer, hats were thrown in the air and the speaker was dragged down from the platform to be carried on the shoulders of the enthusiastic crowd that wended its way up Fifth Avenue.


He refused to give his name, but his chance words had touched the keynote of what the Altar of Liberty means to the people of New York.

### FLU HAS SURRENDERED TOO.

Epidemic Now Officially Regarded as Suppressed.

The "flu" also has surrendered. Dr. Copeland, Commissioner of Health, said this morning that the Spanish influenza epidemic may be regarded as definitely suppressed. There are some new cases and some additional deaths have been reported, but the figures are so small that by comparison with the population the gain is no longer a cause for alarm.

In three days there have been only 205 deaths from influenza and only 260 from pneumonia.



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
