TEACHER'S BODY MISTAKEN FOR HEAP OF OLD CLOTHES

Miss Inez Smith of Kingston Believed to Have Leaped From Window.

Mistaken for a heap of old clothes, the body of Miss Inez Smith, forty-six years old, a school teacher of Kingston, lay in the courtyard of an apartment house at No. 27 West 15th Street for several hours this morning until a janitor investigated and called the police. The latter reported the woman had leaped from a window on the fourth floor while in a fit of melancholia.

It was learned Miss Smith had taught school for twenty-nine years and recently suffered a breakdown. She was visiting her sister, Mrs. Thomas Smith, who lives in the apartment house. Last night at 10 o'clock, Mrs. Smith told detectives she helped her sister to bed, and heard her go to the bathroom at midnight.

At 6 o'clock this morning the janitor, Elizabeth Griffin, saw what she thought was a pile of clothing in the yard, but paid no attention to it until 8 o'clock. After she found the body of Miss Smith, she called the police. Her sister went to her room and found it empty with the window raised.

COOPER HEWITT DIVORCED AND WED IN THREE WEEKS

Inventor's Relatives Announce Facts, but No Details Are Made Public. Relatives of the family to-day declined to give details of Peter Cooper Hewitt's divorce and remarriage within a period of three weeks. Mr. Hewitt

who lives at No. 11 Lexington Avenue, is an electrical inventor, son of former Mayor Abram S. Hewitt and grandson of Peter Cooper. In 1887 his marriage to Miss Lucy Work, a daughter of Frank Work, was the social event of the season. Three weeks ago it is understood, they were divorced, but where and on what grounds is not made public. A few days ago, according to relatives, Mr. Hewitt was married to a Miss or Mrs. Brugliere somewhere outside New York City. It could not be learned where they are spending their honeymoon. The first Mrs. Hewitt sailed on the Adriatic yesterday to do war work. Cooper Hewitt is fifty-seven years old.

PARENTS OF FOURTEEN FIND FOUNDLING AT DOOR

Stranger Infant Was Taken In, but Eventually Found Its Way to Bellevue.

Bobby Douder, No. 308 East 70th Street, has been a soldier. He was mustered out a few days ago and came home to see his seventy-year-old father and mother last night. Bobby climbed the five flights and

knocked at the door. His old mother was there with outstretched arms. "Bobby, my boy," she cried. "Come in; I have a great surprise for you." In a bedroom, tucked snugly beneath the sheets was a four-month-old baby girl. Bobby took one look and fled. The baby was found by Mrs. Douder at 10 o'clock last night, just outside her door. It was wrapped warmly and a bottle of milk had been placed near the bundle. No identification of any kind was to be found on the child's clothing. Just why the person who abandoned the child should have walked up five flights of narrow stairs to deposit the human package is something for the detectives to discover. Mr. and Mrs. Frank Douder are the parents of fourteen children. The sup-

position is that the mother of the little stranger thought that parents who can bring up fourteen children wouldn't mind just one more. The child, after enjoying the hospitality of the East 70th Street home overnight, was taken to the East 67th Street Police Station. After being finger-printed it was reshipped to the founding ward at Bellevue Hospital.

THEFTS OF MERCHANDISE VALUED AT \$8,000 CHARGED

Police Say Two Confess to Shipping Stolen Goods Out of the City.

Charles Feuerman and Charles Stein, both of No. 1983 Yale Street, the Bronx, were arraigned to-day in the Jefferson Market Court on a charge of grand larceny. The police declare they have confessed to the theft of between \$7,000 and \$8,000 worth of merchandise shipped from out of town in the last three months.

The men had an office at No. 3 West 21st Street and other headquarters at No. 211 Market Street, Paterson, N. J. According to information gained by a detective, Stein and Feuerman induced employees of the American Railway Express Company to put new labels on goods in their care so that they were sent to the Paterson headquarters. Then they were shipped to the office in West 21st Street. It is charged, and sold.

The police declare several thousand dollars worth of goods was recovered, both in the New York and Paterson offices, together with checks showing where some of the other goods was sold.
