

ROOSEVELT'S JIM, ROUGH RIDER HERO, NOW A BRONX PET

Colonel's Favorite Charger in Cuba, Thirty Years Old, Living in Luxury.

Good old Jim, Col. Roosevelt's favorite mount during the Cuban campaign—the horse that led the Rough Riders and rode his master to victory and fame—is likely to soon follow to the great beyond, where there are no battles to be fought and where there is peace everlasting.

Jim is now thirty years old. He was bought by the United States Government for service in the Spanish-American war. Jim immediately attracted the eye of Col. Roosevelt, and when the Rough Riders left Key West for service in Cuba, Jim went as the mount of the gallant leader. Jim saw service throughout the campaign.

Since 1898 Jim has been the property of Julius Figliuolo, a contractor living at No. 719 Union Avenue, the Bronx. Because of his friendship for Col. Roosevelt, and because of a promise he made to the Colonel at the time he bought Jim, Mr. Figliuolo has not permitted Jim to be worked in fact the only service Jim has performed for the family was to take the members to church on Sundays and to occasionally take the head of the family to his work.

"My friends often asked me why I kept old Jim in the stable," Mr. Figliuolo explained. "They could not understand why I kept a horse when I have two automobiles for myself and Jim ever since he became my property. I promised Col. Roosevelt years ago that Jim would be cared for, and I know that I have kept that promise. My only regret is that Col. Roosevelt did not see Jim in the past few years. If he had he would have known that he was passing his last days in comfort and as happy as money, food and care can make him."

Jim occupies a stall in a steam-heated stable in the rear of the beautiful Figliuolo home. His bed of straw is as soft as a mattress. Jim has nothing but crushed oats, choice hay and a big bowl of water to eat and drink. For Jim had his teeth cleaned every year, and the only thing lost to him was the joy of being able to munch the fine timothy hay which is served about the stable.

Aside from the luxury which surrounds Jim, he has his own groom to look after his wants. For a portion he has Brownie, a big brown pointer dog. The pair are great chums, and when Jim whines for anything and cannot make himself heard by the groom, Brownie comes about the yard, barking until some one is attracted and Jim is looked after. Some years ago, J. R. Williams gave Mr. Figliuolo the splendid grey Danes, a winner of many trophies. Jim and Brownie were great chums until Danes fell ill with spinal trouble and died. Since then Jim has not been the same horse.

Jack Flynn, who represented the United States Government in the sale of horses used in the Spanish-American War, sold Jim to Mr. Figliuolo, and a letter from him and another from Col. Roosevelt are evidence that Jim is the original Rough Rider horse. Besides that, Jim has the initials "U. S." branded on his left forehead, while the initials "E. R." are branded on his hind quarters. The brand which Col. Roosevelt used to protect Jim from the weather and which also bears the initials "E. R." is still in the possession of Mr. Figliuolo.

Jim might live several years longer. He may pass away any day. He has never been sick a day since he has been with Mr. Figliuolo, and whenever taken out for his exercise he has displayed the same strenuous nature that made his one-time master noted throughout the world.

At any rate, when Jim does pass away, his days will end in peace and comfort. His body will not go to the scavenger.

"Jim will have a resting place," Mr. Figliuolo says. "He has served his country well and faithfully. It is the least I can do for the dumb hero."

To Quit Shipping Board.
David A. Whamond, purchasing agent here for the United States Shipping Board, division of operations, since May 1, 1917, has tendered his resignation, effective Jan. 31. Recruited from the New York and Porto Rico Line when the Shipping Board was organized, he built up an organization of more than 100 persons through which supplies were procured and outfitting. He will return to his former position with the Porto Rico Line.

SLAYER IS EXECUTED; HIDES FATE FROM FAMILY

Cleveland Dies in Chair Without Notifying Daughters He Had Even Been Arrested.

Alton Cleveland, forty of Brooklyn, paid the penalty for murder in the Sing Sing without letting his two daughters, one of whom was married recently, know of his conviction.

He told the prison authorities the reason his daughters had never written or visited him was because they knew nothing of his fate, and he did not want them to. His sons, who they had no real notion of his execution.

Cleveland killed May Lamm, who had killed him, by shooting her down on the sidewalk in Brooklyn Feb. 18 last. He was sentenced to life last night.

CHARGES BUSINESS PLOT.

Variety House Maker Sues Bosses for \$200,000.

Alleging that the treasurer of his company conspired with John and Charles M. Rosser of Louis Luzzari & Co., owners of Brooklyn's biggest hotel, to ruin him and gain possession of his business, William M. Ducker, president of the Ducker Company, a New Jersey corporation, maker of portable houses, sought to recover \$200,000 from the Rosser brothers in a suit begun in the Brooklyn Federal Court.

The Ducker Company was organized in 1909. Ducker charges that while he was in Europe, between 1914 and 1915, William H. Hayden, treasurer of his company, and the two Rosser brothers conspired to ruin and advertise that Louis Rosser & Sons made portable houses that were manufactured by the Ducker Company.

Swedish Seamen's Strike Spreads to Most Ports.

STOCKHOLM, Jan. 10.—The strike of the Swedish Seamen's Union has spread to virtually all ports and is endangering the supply of foodstuffs and raw material. The strikers have rejected Government mediation. The Swedish American liner Stockholm on her next voyage, on Jan. 18, will be manned by American deckhands.
