**SEIZURE OF SECURITIES
WORTH SEVERAL MILLIONS**

Bankers' Trust Sues National Corporation for \$10,472,302, Alleging Interest Default.
On a warrant of attachment sworn out by the Bankers' Trust Company, Sheriff Knott took possession yesterday of securities belonging to the National Securities Corporation, a Virginia concern.
The trust company, in a suit against the corporation for \$10,472,302, alleges

it has defaulted in the payment of interest on two issues of bonds put out in July, 1914.
Sheriff Knott served notice of the writ on the Guaranty Trust Company, which holds stocks and bonds amounting to between \$10,000,000 and \$15,000,000, in which the defendant company has an equity of more than \$2,000,000. He also attached at the office of the Electric Bond and Share Company securities to the value of \$135,500 and two notes for \$18,000.
The National Securities Corporation is a holding company for the control of all properties formerly independently operated by the Idaho Railway, Light and Power Company, Idaho Power and Light Company and several others.
If the whole amount called for in the attachment is seized the country's fees will be \$20,000.

**VETERAN MARKSMAN
IS MISSING IN ACTION**

Sergt. Whalen of Richmond Hill Was Member of 165th—One Soldier Reads "Obituary."


Sergt. Lawrence J. Whalen, Sharpshooter, 165th Infantry, reported missing Sept. 27, was originally a member of the 23d Regiment. He

went over with the Rainbow Division in November, 1917, and passed through all of the principal battles. A nephew of the Whalen Brothers of Brooklyn, his home was with sisters in Richmond Hill.
Lieut. Thomas M. Bogan, 205th Infantry, is dead of wounds received in the Argonne Oct. 6. Drafted in September, 1917, he was made a Sergeant at Camp Upton, two months later commissioned Second Lieutenant, and sent to France last April. He lived with sisters in Yonkers. Corp. Clarence T. Barnes, Company

K, 211th Infantry, reported killed, is alive. In a recent letter to his sister, Miss Stella Barnes of Port Chester, he speaks of reading with surprise his obituary published in a local paper, and goes on to say: "The surgeons in the hospitals over here are doing wonderful work. I have seen cases where arms and legs have been all torn by shrapnel and the bones all shattered. A non-professional person would think it useless to try to save them, but, surprising as it is, in a few months we see the same fellows around almost as good as ever. But where the most wonderful work is

done is on the jaw, or face shot away. I have seen some of the plaster casts of men before the surgeons did their work, and then have seen the men after they have been well, I might say, remodelled."
