tial law. The troops are here at the request of Gov. Lister simply to cooperate with the municipal authorities and protect property. "Any man who attempts to take over control of municipal government functions here will be shot on sight. Strikers have not taken over government functions in Seattle,

they will not be allowed to, despite their published statements that they intend to operate the light plant and help police the city. The seat of city government is still at the City Hall. At Tacoma, where a similar sympathetic strike is in progress the situation was reported to-day to have given indications of improvement. Only a few trades unions participated in the general walk-out. The street car men there were expected to return to work today, as it was said their strike orders were jammed through a misunderstanding. The barbers also were to reopen their shops. Other Tacoma crafts on strike were the timber workers and the retail clerks. Approximately 200 troops under command of Brig. Gen. Frank B. Watson of the 26th Infantry Brigade, are on duty in Tacoma, guarding power

plants, the Tacoma Shipbuilding Company's yards, an open shop concern, and other unions are held in readiness for emergencies at the Army. MORE FIGHTING IN BREMEN.

Communists Retreat Before Government Troops After Heavy Losses
BERLIN, Wednesday, Feb. 6 (Associated Press).—Unconfirmed press despatches from Bremen indicate that the insurgents there are continuing guerrilla warfare in the outskirts of the city and in the harbor, notwithstanding the government's claim that the uprising was quelled on Tuesday. The casualties are estimated at thirty dead and over 100 wounded, the insurgents being the heaviest losers. The Communists beat a retreat toward the suburbs as soon as government troops began to advance in earnest.

Belgium Would Borrow Rolling Stock From U.S.

WASHINGTON, Feb. 7.—The Belgian Government has asked the United States to lend it 100 locomotives and 2,000 passenger cars in addition to returning all the 250 locomotives which were placed at the disposal of the American expeditionary forces.

MADISON, Wis., Feb. 7.—Bolehevism in Wisconsin will be confined to definite limits by the full authority and force of the Government. Those who attempt to stir up discontent will be forced to leave the country. This is the policy laid down to-day by United States District Attorney H. O. Wolfe.

Hays Speaks at Indiana Memorial to Roosevelt.

INDIANAPOLIS, Ind., Feb. 7.—Tribute to the life and patriotism of Col. Roosevelt was paid by Will H. Hays, Chairman of the Republican National Committee, at the Roosevelt Memorial session of the Indiana Legislature here to-day. "The lesson of patriotism of Theodore Roosevelt," said Chairman Hays, "is his monument."

Four More Ships Returned.

WASHINGTON, Feb. 7.—Four steamers were released from requisition by the shipping board to-day and turned back to their owners. They are the Parismina, owned by the United Fruit Company; the Venezuela, Pacific Mail Steamship Company; Fairmont, Coastwise Transportation Company; and Clare, Bull Steamship Company.

Seaplanes Bomb Portuguese Railway.

LISBON, Tuesday, Feb. 4.—Two seaplanes of the Portuguese Republican forces have dropped proclamations on Oporto, the monarchist stronghold, and returned safely to Aviz. They also bombarded and damaged the railway from Espinho to Graua.

\$600,000,000 More Treasury Certificates.

WASHINGTON, Feb. 7.—A new offering of Treasury certificates of indebtedness amounting to \$600,000,000 with interest at rate of 4 1/2 per cent. was announced to-day by the Treasury. The certificates will be dated Feb. 12 and will be payable July 12 next. Subscription books will close Feb. 20.

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LANDECK JURY DISAGREES IN \$100,000 BOND SUIT

Wisconsin Company Sued Woman to Recover Securities Given to Her by Millionaire.

Mrs. Madeline English Landeck is still technically in possession of \$100,000 in Montana Iron and Coal Company bonds which were given to her by the late Charles H. Smith, President of the Madeline Woodensaw Company of Menasha, Wis. The jury which heard the

case to recover them from Mrs. Landeck failed to agree. The jurors stood six to six practically from the beginning of deliberations. The woodensaw company has actual possession of the bonds on a writ of replevin, and its counsel made a motion for a new trial. It was learned that the jurors were perplexed because no evidence had been offered at the trial to explain why the Wisconsin millionaire gave the bonds to Mrs. Landeck. Counsel for both sides declined to divulge information concerning her and she said that her counsel had instructed her not to tell who she lived with, who she was or whether she was married or single. The only evidence bearing on this point was that Mrs. Landeck and

Smith met in 1910 and that he gave the bonds to her in 1912. In preparation for the trial, it was learned to-day, former Justice Gott granted an order to the Montana Company's counsel to examine a witness before the trial among them Mrs. Landeck, and her brother, Madeline Carlisle English of Everett, Washington. This testimony did much to clear the atmosphere of mystery that surrounded the trial.
