HOTEL REGISTERS SHOW CONFLICTS IN ROY TYLER'S ALIBI

Answers to Evening World Telegrams Disclose Discrepancies in Dates and Places.

Roy Tyler, charged with two murders and the theft of \$13,000 in a Brooklyn savings bank on Dec. 13, gave District Attorney Lewis of Brooklyn a list of places where he

said he stopped in the Southwest about the time of the crime. The Evening World wired to the cities named and herewith presents the results of its investigation. Several of the telegrams show confusions as to dates and places, in the alibi set up by Tyler. The Brooklyn authorities suspect Tyler of copying the name he says he used—F. H. McGann—from hotel registers for the purpose of "framing up" an alibi, hence efforts were made to learn in what position on the registers the name appears. In several cases it was at the middle of the page or at the top. Tyler says he stopped at the hotel at Socorro, N. M., on Dec. 10, registering with his wife as Mr. and Mrs. F. H. McGann. The Evening World sent the following telegram on March 29: "Manager Hotel, Socorro, N. M.

"Roy Tyler, arrested here charged with bank hold-up and a murder Dec. 13, claims he stopped at your hotel Dec. 10 under name F. H. McGann and wife. Did he? Please wire description of couple, our expense." The following reply was received:

"Socorro, N. M., March 29. "City Editor, Evening World, New York, N. Y.—"F. H. McGann and wife registered at my hotel Dec. 9, left morning of Dec. 10. Sheriff Baca of this county has a photograph sent out by your officials which he believes to be the man that was here last December. McGann registered in about the middle of the hotel register. "George Curry, proprietor, Chamber Hotel."

Tyler said he stopped at Winslow, Ariz., on Dec. 12 and left there the next day. He said he stopped at a hotel two blocks west of the Harvey House. The Evening World sent the following telegram:

"Manager hotel two blocks west of Harvey House, Winslow, Ariz. "Roy Tyler, arrested here charged with bank holdup and murder in Brooklyn Dec. 13, claims he and wife stopped your hotel Dec. 12 and 13 as F. H. McGann and wife. Did he? Please wire detailed description couple. This vital as police suspect he copied names from hotel register as alibi."

The following reply was received: "Winslow, Ariz., March 29. "City Editor Evening World, New York, N. Y. "Our register shows J. H. McGann and wife on top of page. Register not dated, but names appear after Dec. 12. Woods Hotel."

Tyler declared he stopped at the Harvey House at Seligman, Ariz., on Dec. 12. The name was found on the register and The Evening World wired for further details. The following reply was received: "Seligman, Ariz., March 30, 1919. "Evening World, New York, N. Y. "Mr. and Mrs. McGann arrived late at night and departed early in the morning. Sorry but unable to give any better description. Position of name about the middle of register. Will mail you the original signature. "P. L. FORE."

Tyler said that on Dec. 15 or 16, under the name of F. H. McGann and wife, he registered at the Baltimore Hotel at Los Angeles and stayed there three nights. The Evening World wired for confirmation of this and received the following reply:

"Los Angeles, Cal., March 29. "City Editor, Evening World, New York, N. Y. "McGann not registered Baltimore. "Los Angeles News Bureau."

Tyler also mentioned being in Albuquerque, N. M. A message to The Evening World from a newspaper there said no trace of him had been found. The impression seemed to be gaining ground in Brooklyn to-day that the authorities had not been able to obtain sufficient evidence against Tyler to warrant bringing him to trial.

"We want to be certain that he is not the man we want before we turn Tyler over to anybody else," said District Attorney Lewis to-day. "If he is innocent, of course we do not want to prosecute him. He came here willingly to answer to the Brooklyn charge, but refuses to be questioned about any other of our cases against him. I have found him polite, clean, more nervous than any other prisoner I have ever seen, and possessing a highly developed sense of humor."

Capt. Coughlin, who is handling the police end of the investigation, said he would not be able to give an opinion until the return of one of his men who is travelling through
