

PROUD ARKANSAS GIVES NAMESAKE SHIP SILVER SERVICE

Presentation on Superdreadnought a Ceremonious Affair.

After several years and much effort on the part of Miss Daisy Deiny of Little Rock, Ark., the people of that State, through their Legislature, presented a beautiful silver service set to the superdreadnought Arkansas yesterday as she lay at anchor off 79th Street and North River.

One of the features of the presentation was the appointment by Gov. C. H. Brough of Arkansas, as special delegate, of Baby Edward Otis Mitchell, youngest Arkansas Traveler and son of Paymaster Mason E. Mitchell of the U. S. S. Delaware. Baby Mitchell is ten months old, and immediately after the festivities was christened by Chaplain D. W. McClelland of the U. S. S. Arkansas in honor of the occasion. Paymaster and Mrs. Mitchell live at Conway, Ark. Rear Admiral E. W. Eberle, United States Navy, who is commander of the Sixth Battleship Squadron and himself a native of Arkansas, hailed from Fort Smith, was official guest of honor. He was accompanied by his staff and received on board with full honors. Prior to the presentation, the officers and crew of the Arkansas were called to "quarters," and remained standing at attention while the band struck up the national anthem. Capt. L. H. De Stieguer, commanding the U. S. S. Arkansas, made a short address, explaining that Gov. C. H. Brough of Arkansas was unable to be present, but had delegated Miss Daisy Deiny to make the presentation address for the people of that State. Miss Deiny opened the programme in a very stirring speech, and dwelt at considerable length on what the U. S. S. Arkansas meant to the people of the State. She also complimented the officers and crew on the fine record the ship had made during the war, saying that the prayers and hopes of the people always went with the ship wherever she sailed. Capt. A. R. Smith, U. S. Navy, a former commanding officer of the Arkansas, gave a brief history of the activities of the ship from the time she went into commission. Among the presentations were two very handsome trophy cups, which were awarded to the crew. One was given by the Daughters of the American Revolution of the State of Arkansas, and is to be an annual prize to the run crew which makes the best record. Mrs. Rosa McClain, a delegate of the D. A. R., made the presentation. The other was given by the Society of Arkansas Travelers, and is to be an annual prize for the best cutter race crew on the ship. Miss Tin Spirey of the Arkansas Travelers made that presentation. Capt. De Stieguer accepted the trophy cups on behalf of the crew. Miss Deiny, whose home is in Little Rock, made the formal presentation of the silver service, and Capt. de Stieguer, in his speech of acceptance, thanked Miss Deiny for her indefatigable efforts and the people of the State of Arkansas for their gift to the ship, which he said was very deeply cherished and appreciated.

'8' HOHENZOLLERN'S HOODOO

Figure Consistent in Disasters of Over 300 Years.

BERLIN, April 23.—Correspondence of the Associated Press.—A student of history has discovered that the figure 8 has played a dramatic role in the lives of the Hohenzollerns. Two German Emperors died in 1838. Two attempts were made on the Kaiser's life in 1874. Frederick William IV's mental disease compelled him to make way for a regency in 1858. The year 1848 brought revolutions and a terrible humiliation for the King. Frederick the Great suffered his severest defeat in 1763 at Hochkirch. The Thirty Years' War began in 1618 and brought unspeakable misery to the lands of the Hohenzollerns. The great Elector died in 1688. Elector Johann Sigismund in 1688 and Elector Johann George in 1699. The crowning disaster to the Hohenzollerns came in 1713.

RACE RIOTS IN CHICAGO.

Bricks, Clubs and Guns Used and Many Injured. CHICAGO, April 23.—One negro will probably die as the result of a series of fights on the south side last night between white and negro residents. Bricks, clubs and bullets were used promiscuously and many on each side were hurt. Racial feeling has been gaining in intensity, the police say, since the encroachment of negroes from what is known as the south side black belt into a district farther eastward.
