JACK GERAGHTY SUED BY WIFE WHO WAS JULIA FRENCH

Society Girl Who Wed Father's Chauffeur Charges Neglect and Cruelty.

ELOPEMENT IN 1911. One-Time Leader at Newport Reconciled to Family After Marriage.

NEWPORT, R. I., April 28.—Mrs. Jack Geraghty, who before her marriage to her father's chauffeur was Miss Julia Estelle French, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Tuck French, to-day filed a suit for divorce.

Mrs. Geraghty charges neglect to provide and extreme cruelty. She asks the custody of their six-year-old son, Jack, Jr.

All Newport was stirred when Julia French, a niece of Mrs. Elsie French Vanderbilt, ran away on August 9, 1911, with Jack Geraghty, son of a Newport livery stable keeper, and married him at Central Village, Conn. The beginning of the romance had been observed by the French family for some time and the young people had been sternly warned to cease their meetings.

For a year the French family would have nothing to do with young Mrs. Geraghty. The young people lived in Springfield for a time on a farm near Woburn. Geraghty had a brief season of prosperity as an automobile sales man—he was an excellent chauffeur—but later became involved in business difficulties. It was noted in the second year of his married life that he was peddling apples from his Woburn farm in Boston.

POLICE AVIATORS BEGIN FLIGHT TO PHILADELPHIA

Inspector Dyer of Reserves One of the Passengers on Way to Quaker City.

The first long airplane flight ever undertaken by a city police department began this afternoon when two New York police aviators, each carrying a passenger, started from Sheepshead Bay for Philadelphia. The start was made at 2 o'clock under excellent atmospheric conditions. Twenty minutes later the two machines reached the City Hall, where they circled twice without landing, then turned south. CROSS SEA FLYERS READY FOR START BUT RAIN FORBIDS

Hawker and Raynham Disappointed After Early Conditions Favor "Hop Off."
