

INDICTED ON CHARGE OF "AMBULANCE CHASING"

Harry Meola of Middletown Accused of Soliciting Damage Claims for Lawyers.

ALBANY, June 2.—Attorney General Charles E. Newton was advised to-day of the indictment of Harry Meola of Middletown for the crime commonly known as "ambulance chasing" and

technically the solicitation of law business for certain Orange and New York County lawyers. The indictments were returned by the Orange County Grand Jury and are novel in the history of criminal law. Meola, who was not admitted to the bar, was accused of approaching eleven residents of Orange County who had claims to recover damages for bodily and other injuries, and soliciting this prospective business for certain lawyers. Deputy Attorney General Wilbur W. Chambers was designated to assist in the prosecution of the case.

GERMAN FATHER IS PROUD OF SON'S YANKEE BRAVERY

Boy, Killed in France, Gets the D. S. C. for Taking Bullet Meant for Officer.

When old Max Hantschke was told to-day that the United States Government was sending him the Distinguished Service Cross conferred posthumously on Eddie Hantschke, his second son, the American from Prussia said:

"I would rather have my boy back than all the decorations of all the governments of the world but next to having Eddie back the Distinguished Service Cross of Uncle Sam would be my second choice."

How Eddie Hantschke, of the Bushwick district of Brooklyn, came to be winner of the D. S. C. is described by records of the War Department in the following citation:

Private Edward Hantschke (deceased), Machine Gun Company 164th Infantry, for extraordinary heroism in action near Panzer, France, September 15, 1918. Seeing that his platoon leader was being fired upon by a German sniper, Private Hantschke, who

was under cover, jumped to his feet and stepping in front of the officer tried to push him into a shell-hole. The bullet intended for the officer struck Private Hantschke in the mouth, killing him instantly.

"Yes," said the old man Hantschke at No. 117 Warfield Street, "that was my boy, that was my Eddie! He was under cover but he jumped up to save his officer! That was Eddie, always a brave lad! My, I'm proud to lose my boy, but proud of the way he went out."

"I'll tell you how it is about me. When I came from Germany I knew what I was doing. I was thirty-six years old. That was twenty-six years ago. I was tired of the old world way of doing things. I wanted to better myself. My three boys were Yankees. Eddie was twenty-one years old. He was a graduate of Public School No. 54 at Evergreen Avenue and Madison Street, and before he went to the war had been a shipping clerk.

"Mamma—that's my wife—died the year the war broke out. She was always hoping and praying that the United States might keep out of it, but that wasn't because she was a German but because she was a mother. She didn't want her boys to go."

"But the boys felt differently. William joined the navy. Eddie went to the army. Ernest remained with me. "It was the feeling in this house that the old German Government was in for a damned fine licking, and when Uncle Sam went in we knew it was coming. We have lots of friends and even relatives in the old country. The fight wasn't against them, but against autocracy, the devilish condition that permitted one man to snap the whip and plunge a nation into war."

"You can tell everybody that Eddie Hantschke was glad to die for the United States and that his daddy will treasure Eddie's Distinguished Service Cross as his proudest worldly possession."
