

**PULITZER PRIZE
AWARDED PAPER
FIGHTING GERMANS**

Milwaukee Journal Declared
Most Meritorious—Tark-
ington Honored.

The Joseph Pulitzer prize, consisting of a \$500 gold medal, "for the most distinguished and meritorious public service rendered by any American newspaper during the year," has been awarded to the Milwaukee Journal, it was announced last night at Columbia University. The award was made by a committee of the faculty of the School of Journalism, consisting of the Director of the school, Dr. J. H. Williams; Prof. Walter B. Dill, Prof. Roscoe C. E. Brown and Robert E. MacArdney. The recommendation of the committee was approved by the Advisory Board of the school and by the trustees of Columbia University in their regular monthly meeting yesterday. The Milwaukee Journal's campaign against Germanism in Wisconsin was given as the reason for the award.

Announcement was also made that the Pulitzer prize of \$1,000, which is awarded "for the American novel published during the year which shall best present the wholesome atmosphere of American life and the highest standard of American manners and manhood," has been awarded to Booth Tarkington for his novel, "The Magnificent Ambersons." The jury which decided the award was composed of Chairman Robert Grant, William Morton Payne and William Lyon Phelps.

At a meeting of the trustees it was announced that the William Hayward Cutting travelling fellowships had been awarded to the following students: John Stittmatter, in Greek and Latin; J. Donald Young, in classical archaeology; Carlisle F. R. Barnett, in integrational law; Joseph Wood Kruskal, in English; Leslie Spier, in anthropology, and Mark Albert Van Doren, in English.

Announcement was also made that Prof. John Dewey of the Department of Philosophy had obtained a year's leave of absence to lecture in the Government University at Peking, China.

B. R. T. on Three eHolidays Carried About 8,000,000.
Announcement was made yesterday by the B. R. T. Company officials that during the three-day holiday, which began last Friday, the railroad carried close to 8,000,000 passengers. Although the traffic was unusually heavy, it did not establish a record. On Friday 2,000,000 nickels were gathered in by the company, while on Saturday the reports show 1,500,000 passengers were carried. On Sunday it was estimated that 1,700,000 persons were carried on the B. R. T. system. These figures, it was stated, included the surface, subway and elevated lines.
