MRS. NOAH ASKS ALIMONY AND GIVES 20 REASONS

Syrian Wife Says Husband Told Her She Was His Slave, Not an American Wife.

In suing for separation from her husband in the Supreme Court in Brooklyn, a Syrian woman to-day named 20 specific reasons why she believes she is entitled to alimony and counsel fees.

In the papers filed before Justice Benedict, Mrs. Noah asserts that her husband beat her over the head with chairs, threw dishes at her, poured hot stew down her shoulders and in other ways abused her.

She charges that since both were Syrians, she must consider herself as American wives do. "He told me," she says the complaint, "that I was his slave."

The Noahs were married June 4, 1915. Her husband divided their apartment in two parts, she declares, and forced her to live in one of these alone; he took from her all her jewelry and prohibited storekeepers from selling food to her.


