

"SECOND BRAVEST MAN" IS DECORATED AT CAMP DIX

With Captured Machine Gun, Private Frank Gaffney Took Eighty Prisoners.

CAMP DIX, June 24.—Landed as "the second bravest man" in the American Army, First-Class Private Frank Gaffney of New York, formerly a member of Company G, 10th Infantry, was decorated by Major Gen. Hale at a special ceremony in the parade grounds here yesterday with the Congressional Medal of Honor, the highest award given an enlisted man in the American Army. Gaffney is cited for conspicuous gallantry at Ransooz, France, on Sept. 29 last, when single-handed and wounded he captured a machine gun nest and with the aid of the captured weapon and a supply of hand grenades brought in eighty prisoners. His Lieutenant and Ser-

geant killed, Gaffney found himself in command of a shattered platoon, and when he led it to the attack he was the only survivor to reach the objective.

"What else could an Irishman do when he had an Irish Colonel behind him," he exclaimed when asked how he summoned up the nerve to attack the whole enemy outfit with only a blouse full of grenades. Gaffney, discharged last week from a general hospital, was badly injured in the fight in which he won fame, one wound having necessitated the amputation of an arm.

All Injured Soldiers Are to Get Training.

WASHINGTON, June 24.—Soldiers and sailors disabled by war would be given the opportunity to begin immediately courses in vocational training at Government expense under terms of an amended Senate bill appropriating \$4,000,000 for the purpose, passed yesterday unanimously by the House. It is estimated that 7,000 men will take advantage of the opportunity within the coming year.

SEES MENACE IN U. S. BUREAU

Senate and House Committee Told Politics Will Enter.

WASHINGTON, June 24.—In opposing establishment of a permanent Federal employment service, E. P. Le Prohon of Salt Lake City told the Joint Senate and House Labor Committee yesterday such a service would be made the instrumentality of politics and that if he were at the head of it he could elect a President of the United States. During the war Mr. Le Prohon was in charge of furnishing labor for the Atlantic Loading Company in New Jersey. Before resuming its hearings yesterday the joint committee decided not to undertake a general investigation of the United States Employment Service, members holding that the committee did not have authority.

Investigation of charges of wastefulness in expenditure of funds made in the House recently by Representative Blanton (Dem., Tex.) against Director General John B. Danmore, will begin to-day.

Cash vs. capital

The annual statement of a big department store in the Middle West contains two deeply interesting items, viz:

Accounts and notes receivable, \$2,243,954.52
Inventories of merchandise, \$2,763,524.06

In plain language this means that the store's charge accounts amount to 80 per cent. of the merchandise it carries.

If it had no charge accounts—that is to say, if it received cash for all its sales—its working capital would be almost cut in two.

Working capital must earn wages, and in this case the wages are almost double what they would be if the store did an exclusively cash business.

The wages of the capital invested in a store are paid by the store's customers. Could there be a stronger argument in support of the economic soundness of our policy of cash buying and cash selling?


