**MARINE PARADE URGED WHEN 8,000 LAND NEXT WEEK**

Secretary Baker Appealed to for Demonstration in Honor of Belleau Wood Heroes.

Assistant Secretary of the Navy Franklin D. Roosevelt, with the aid of Mayor Hylan, is endeavoring to obtain Secretary of War Baker's per-

mission for a parade and reception here of the famous Marine Brigade of the Second Division—the fighters who stopped the Prussian Guard at Belleau Wood, which was rechristened in honor of the American "soldiers of the sea."

About 8,000 men from the Marine Brigade have sailed from Brest on four transports. They will arrive in this city between Aug. 3 and 5. Maj.-Gen. John A. Lejeune, in command of the Second Division, is aboard the George Washington.

"There isn't the slightest doubt but what everyone in New York City wants to see the famous Second Division," said John F. Sinnott, Secretary to the mayor. "Hundreds of requests have been received at City Hall. In the event that the War Department is opposed to a parade here Assistant Secretary Roosevelt will

pled for a parade on the ground that they were recruited to a very large extent from young men in this city."

The General Staff at Washington has no plan for the parade. It was pointed out that weather conditions were severe for parading, particularly as the men had come from a mild climate and were in heavy woolen uniforms.

The total casualties of the 2d Division were 22,286, of which 4,478 were rated as battle deaths. The 2d Division captured the largest number of German prisoners of any division, about one-fourth of the entire number of prisoners taken by the A. E. F., one-fourth of the total of captured guns, and suffering about one-tenth of the entire casualties. The 2d Division received more than 400 D. S. C.'s, more than 100 per cent above the next highest number awarded to an American division.

**GEN. O'RYAN COMPLETES REORGANIZATION PLANS**

Announces He Has Place for Every Officer and Enlisted Man Who Served Overseas.

Major Gen. John F. O'Ryan, commanding the New York Guard, announces that he has completed his reorganization plans. These provide for reestablishing the signal, engineers, cavalry, artillery and sanitary units.

According to Gen. O'Ryan, there is a place in the new guard for every New York State man who served overseas, whether enlisted or commissioned. He advises that officers who desire places should make application to the Adjutant General and that the law provides that they shall be given the highest rank they held in previous service. Division headquarters is maintained in the Municipal Building.

**FOUR BIG TRANSPORTS TO BECOME LINERS AGAIN**

Will Enter Service Between New York and South American Ports.

WASHINGTON, July 28.—Four seven-hundred-ton ships, among the larger vessels now being used as transports, will be turned back to the Shipping Board immediately and placed in South American passenger and freight service out of New York after they are overhauled.

Semi-monthly sailings will be made. It was said to-day at the Shipping Board, and the vessels probably will call at several ports on the Atlantic Coast of South America. Details were to be announced later.

**MAY PROSECUTE PACKERS UNDER ANTI-TRUST LAW**

Department of Justice Planning Action Based on Trade Board Disclosures.

WASHINGTON, July 28.—Preparation of anti-trust action against the big meat packers is being considered by the Department of Justice, it was learned to-day.

Announcements of the department's attitude toward the packers probably will be made this week.

With the report of the Federal Trade Commission before them the Department of Justice officials are giving careful study to the situation.

**BURGLAR STRIKES CHILD, FRACTURING HER SKULL**

Forces Entrance Into Apartment While Her Mother Is Absent, She Orders Him Out.

A burglar, interrupted while robbing the apartment of Mrs. Annie Gohn at No. 125 East 133d Street at noon to-day, struck her ten-year-old daughter Minnie on the head and it is thought fractured the child's skull. He made his escape after missing \$100 in cash and \$200-worth of Liberty Bonds.
