The food will be sold at cost, taking into consideration the transportation charges. The price lists are not yet ready for publication, but may be tomorrow.

Mr. O'Malley was accompanied by Washington by J. B. Stafford and Frank Wilson, representing the Mayor of Buffalo, which city also is eager to obtain army food.

MOTHER FRANTIC AS MEN FAIL TO SAVE BOY'S LIFE

Surgeon Sure Youth Taken From Water Is Dead but Works Two Hours.

EXCITEMENT ON BEACH.

Girl Companion Gives Alarm and Body Is Recovered by Guard.

William Leahy, seventeen, No. 1429 Union Street, Brooklyn, was drowned at Manhattan Beach at noon to-day. He was with a party which included his mother. His body was brought to the beach by Eddie Zimmerman, a lifeguard, and for two hours, though it was certain the boy was dead, artificial respiration was used by hand and then by a pulmotor brought by Ambulance Surgeon Weston from Coney Island Hospital.

Young Leahy went into the water with Helen Lear, fourteen, No. 219 Macon Street. He was a poor swimmer and the girl went out with the beach ahead of him.

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RAIN HELPS SOLDIERS CURB CHICAGO DISORDERS AFTER RIOTERS PLOT GREAT FIRE

Cables Stretched Across Streets Following Use of Torch on Homes in "Black Belt"—Scattering Fights Continue, but Mobs Disappear.

CHICAGO, July 31.—Chicago was comparatively calm to-day for the first time since Sunday, and public officials expressed the belief that the use of 6,000 State troops had effectually quelled the rioters which resulted in thirty deaths and the injury of more than 1,000 persons.

State militiamen are patrolling the danger districts on the South Side. Their appearance on the streets has had the effect of suppressing violent disturbances. They were aided in their work by a driving rain, which kept crowds from gathering in streets.

"TERRORS OF PEACE WORSE THAN THOSE OF WAR," SAYS FOCH

"I Hate All This Posing," Adds the Allied Commander-in-Chief.

LONDON, July 31. MARSHAL FOCH, in an interview given at his hotel in London to-day, said: "For me the terrors of peace are worse than those of war. I hate all this posing."

Major Gen. Maxime Weygand, who is accompanying Marshal Foch, said it was for England to decide what should be done with the former German Emperor. "He is covered with shame and ignominy and branded as a coward," the General declared. "The French people think that that is enough punishment."

PERSHING WANTS OUR DEAD TO REMAIN IN FRANCE

Will Ask Plans for a Permanent Cemetery With Appropriate Monuments.

PARIS, July 31.—Gen. Pershing said to-day that he would advise against the removal to the United States of the American dead buried in France.

40 VILLISTAS KILLED

Routed in Battle With Carranza Forces Near Las Vegas.

GALVESTON, Tex., July 31.—Forty Villistas were killed, eleven taken prisoner and many wounded in a battle between Carranza cavalry and Villistas under Pancho Villa near Las Vegas, on Chihuahua, Mexico, yesterday.

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France Resumes Postal Communication With All Germany. PARIS, July 31.—Postal communication between France and all parts of Germany was resumed to-day.
