

## RECORDS OF MORE ASSEMBLYMEN HIT BY CITIZENS' UNION

Activities of Kings, Queens and Richmond Men Are Criticized.

The Citizens' Union Committee on Legislation made public to-day a summary of its estimate of the records of Assemblymen from Kings, Queens and Richmond, as follows:

**KINGS COUNTY.**  
**BRAUN, GEORGE J.** (Dem., 20th Dist.)—Continued inattention and often unrecorded on roll calls. His value negligible.  
**BURN, FREDERICK S.** (Dem., 9th Dist.)—An intelligent and experienced member with a disappointing record although his votes show improvement over last year.  
**CAULFIELD, JAMES H. JR.** (Rep., 5th Dist.)—Active and independent. Worked hard and effectively for the defeat of bad pension legislation. Record of votes very good.  
**COX, THOMAS J.** (Dem., 3d Dist.)—Active in behalf of his own bills but otherwise inattentive. Ineffective. Average record of votes.  
**DONNELLY, MORGAN T.** (Dem., 12th Dist.)—In his third term record remained unsatisfactory. Unrecorded on some important roll calls.  
**DRESCHELER, DAVID** (Dem., 16th Dist.)—New member with a fair voting record, who showed some promise of future usefulness.  
**FLANAGAN, EDWARD J.** (Dem.,

4th Dist.)—First year member who showed considerable activity but no particular capacity for legislative duties. Frequently unrecorded on important roll calls. Poor record of votes.  
**GRIFFITH, JOHN J.** (Dem., 1st Dist.)—Inattentive and inconspicuous. Frequently not recorded on important roll calls. Of no value to the City as a legislator.  
**JOHNSON, CHARLES C.** (Dem., 18th Dist.)—Able and intelligent legislator who made a good record of votes and other activities in his first term.  
**KELLY, JOHN J.** (Dem., 7th Dist.)—New member with poor record of votes and activities.  
**KLANGMAN, BENJAMIN C.** (Dem., 19th Dist.)—Continued in third term a wholly useless member with bad record of votes.  
**LENTOL, JOSEPH** (Dem., 14th Dist.)—A new member with a colorful record, but with fair record of votes.  
**LINK, ALBERT** (Dem., 15th Dist.)

—An erratic legislator with a fair record of votes. His legislative initiative considered and lacking in merit.  
**LYONS, DANIEL J.** (Dem., 11th Dist.)—A new member, alert and intelligent and of some promise.  
**MCARDLE, PETER A.** (Dem., 10th Dist.)—His record showed improvement over previous years. Fair record of votes.  
**MCWILLIAMS, CHRISTIAN J.** (Dem., 15th Dist.)—New member, frequently absent on important roll calls. Record unsatisfactory.  
**MORRIS, JAMES J.** (Dem., 22d Dist.)—Ineffective. His record negligible.  
**SMITH, HONIE W.** (Dem., 10th Dist.)—Ineffective. Unrecorded on many roll calls. Bad record of votes.  
**SOLOMON, CHARLES** (Rep., 23d Dist.)—New member, able in debate, with excellent record of votes on city measures.  
**SOLOMON, MARTIN** (Dem., 6th Dist.)—New member. Not conspicuous. Average record of votes.  
**TAYLOR, FRANK J.** (Dem., 3d Dist.)—Legislator of experience, but without effectiveness. Record of votes poor.  
**WELLS, FREDERICK A.** (Rep., 17th Dist.)—Member of experience with poor voting record. With the close of the war his only value in the Legislature, familiarity with military affairs, disappeared.  
**YOUNKER, WILFRED E.** (Rep., 21st Dist.)—His thorough knowledge of legislation and city needs makes his presence at Albany of increasing value. Excellent record of votes.

**QUEENS COUNTY.**  
**BRACKLEY, ALBERT J.** (Dem., 5th Dist.)—Not especially active, but showed independence and his record of votes was above the average.  
**HOPKINS, FRANK E.** (Rep., 4th Dist.)—Intelligent and sincere legislator, but not careful about his votes. Record disappointing. Deserves credit for bringing about defeat of bad salary increase bill.  
**KENNEDY, JOHN** (Dem., 3d Dist.)—Record slightly improved over the colorless record of his first term.  
**LEYNINGER, PETER A.** (Dem., 1st Dist.)—Energetic, active and in many respects useful. His record shows some improvement, especially in record of votes, which was considerably above the average.  
**O'HARE, WILLIAM H.** (Dem., 6th Dist.)—Legislator of experience and industry, who showed some improvement in his record of votes.  
**SCHWAB, BERNARD** (Dem., 2d Dist.)—New member, not very active, but with fair record of votes.

**RICHMOND COUNTY.**  
**CURLEY, THOMAS F.** (Democrat, First District)—Active and attentive. Worked hard for his Richmond local legislation. Record of votes on city measures below average, and did not show much improvement.  
**SEBASTIAN, HENRY A.** (Democrat, Second District)—Member of experience who continued a disappointing record of votes and other activities.


**H. C. OF WORMING MAKES BOLSHIEVIKI OF MILDEST FISH**  
**Fluke and Bass Openly Sneer at Anglers' Hooks, Left Empty by Bail Profiteers.**  
 The reason for the disorderly conduct of the fish in the waters around New York has no more connection with the recent strikes of marine engineers and harbor boatmen than Lindley M. Garrison, has with the American Federation of Labor. It is due entirely to worms. The fishermen can't get worms and the fish have become defiant.  
 For two days the Marine Editor had been receiving telephone calls from old subscribers complaining of the way the fish are behaving. Twenty years ago, when rum was sold openly in these parts at 15 cents a throw and the bottle was placed on the counter (bar, as it was called) so that you might help yourself, reports of this kind were common. In Prohibition times the rumors appeared to merit investigation.  
 Judge Henry Clay Thomas of Hingham, Mass., a passenger on the Fall River boat Monday morning, complained to The Evening World that a school of striped bass followed the Fribella two miles and a half through the Sound looting at the passengers.  
 August Frensteg Schneider, a dealer at New Dorp, S. I., offered an affidavit that weakfish down that way are thumping their noses at people.  
 "Hopping right up out of the water," Doc Schneider said, "shoving their tails around to their front doors and wagging 'em like fury."  
 So, the question arose, "Where are the fishermen?" And the facts came out: It is all about the high cost of living.  
 Dealers in bait are asking 25 cents a dozen for bloodworms, and just as much for a teeny tiny little mudworm as for a big fat mudworm that would make a meal for a family of five fluke.  
 And the dealers, when you holler and try to pin them down, blame the bloodworm diggers of Canarie and roundabout and say the bloodworm diggers want 110 or some other scandalous figure for a three-hour day. Ordinary sandworms still are quoted at 20 cents a dozen, but a sandworm is as much help in landing bass and such as a bathing suit in the Alps. A striped bass in the prime of life can get away with a dozen sandworms like a loft robber cracking a safe.  
 The reporter who spent two whole days on the story (and who, it may be explained, came to the Evening World with a recommendation from his pastor as a young man who never tasted intoxicating liquor in his life) has asked for another day in which to visit the bait-diggers of Canarie. He suspects that the retail dealers of Manhattan are lying like anything and are nothing but a lot of profiteers who ought to be investigated.  
 Best the reporter that the fish have grown inattent and dozing, he says, is gospel truth. Nobody is going after them with the right kind of bait, he says, and they are riding rough shod over the people. In his own words the fish in New York waters to-day are the worst brought up lot of fish he ever saw.


