will materially increase the cost of living to them.

"Federal extravagance, State extravagance and City extravagance, if permitted to go unchecked will bring about a condition of unrest which will seriously impair and shake the confidence of the people in our form of government. The greater the Governmental extravagance the greater the opportunity for the financial rings to continue their hold upon the affairs of Government by dictating to public officials the policy of Government."

"The Chairman of the Finance and Budget Committee should reconvene his committee without delay, and should eliminate from the budget every expenditure that is not a necessity. I shall ask the heads of departments directly under me to give the Chairman of the Committee every possible co-operation in revising the budget and I am sure that the Borough President will do likewise. Unless this is done I will not vote for its approval."

EDUCATION DEPARTMENT ASKS BIGGEST INCREASE.

Among the largest increases are the Department of Education, which requests \$87,031,061, or \$41,929,895 more than last year. The new amount asked for includes \$28,588,496 for new sites and buildings, \$2,558,216 for the redemption of tax notes and the remainder for tuition in the elementary and higher schools.

The Police Department is allowed \$4,691,487 over 1918, and the Fire Department \$2,470,321. Public Charities has been raised \$1,703,712. The Street Cleaning Department is granted an increase of \$2,303,112, and the Department of Water Supply an increase of \$641,931.

The largest item in the budget, nearly 25 per cent. of the entire amount, is set aside for "debt service," which is for payment of interest and redemption of bonds. This totals \$74,811,533, and is \$3,120,399 less than last year.

For direct State taxes the Albany Government has levied on New York City for \$5,529,154, an increase of \$16,528 over last year.

Payment to private charitable institutions are to be \$1,199,587 over last year.

COL. HOUSE IMPROVES.

Will Remain in Bed a Few Days, Ready to Get Rest.

A marked improvement in the condition of Col. Edward M. House was reported this morning at his home, No. 115 East 53d Street.

"His condition is very much improved this morning," said Dr. Albert R. Lamb after spending three-quarters of an hour at the house. "Probably no further bulletins will be needed. The Colonel is not in any danger at present, but he will remain in bed for a few days to rest."

It was said that X-ray photographs probably would be taken when the patient has regained his strength. He received many flowers and sympathetic messages to-day.

LOSES VALUABLE PAPERS.

Collector of Internal Revenue Edwards Advertises in Vain.

Collector of Internal Revenue Edwards has lost a brief case containing valuable personal papers. He thinks he left it in a polling booth in 6th Street, just west of Broadway, where he registered Saturday from the Hotel Marie Antoinette.

He advertised his loss Sunday, but has heard nothing of the missing documents.

FOR LIEUTENANT GENERALS.

Senate Bill Would Promote March, Liggett and Bullard.

WASHINGTON, Oct. 14.—Appointment of Gen. March, Chief of Staff, and Major General Hunter Liggett and Robert L. Bullard to the permanent rank of Lieutenant General in recognition of their services during the war would be authorized under a bill introduced to-day by Chairman Wadsworth, of the Senate Military Committee.

PASSPORT FLAW KEEPS BRITISH CREW ON SHIP

Here to Take Over Old German Liner Cleveland, but Can't Land Until Washington Acts.

The White Star liner Belgic, which arrived to-day from Liverpool, brought 163 officers and men, under the command of Capt. G. E. Butler, who were sent out by the Peninsula & Oriental Navigation Company to take over the old Hamburg-American liner Cleveland, now known as the transport Mobile. Because Capt. Butler and his men neglected to have their passports vised by the American consul at Liverpool, they are being detained on board the Belgic until permission can be obtained from the State Department for them to land.

Another passenger on the Belgic was Captain Albert Hamilton Summers, who took the White Star liner Georgic out of this port in December, 1914, and was captured when two-thirds of the way across by the German raider Moewe. Capt. Summers and his crew were placed on board the Yarrowdale, the Georgic was sunk, and the prisoners taken to Kiel, where they were held until December, 1918. Capt. Summers comes to command the White Star liner Canopic, due here to-morrow from Boston, and will relieve Capt. Frank Berry, who goes to England on a leave of absence.

TRAINMEN'S HEAD ASSAILS UNAUTHORIZED STRIKES

Lee Says Nation Faces Upheaval Unless Labor Radicals Are Curbed.

WASHINGTON, Oct. 14.—President W. G. Lee of the Brotherhood of Railroad Trainmen to-day sounded a warning to organized labor and to the public against the undermining effects of radicalism as expressed through unauthorized strikes.

"The unauthorized strikes of the longshoremen and printers in New York show that the one big union idea daily is gaining ground in the ranks of organized labor, whose leaders are fighting Bolshevism and I. W. Wism," said Lee.

"Unauthorized strikes show that radicals are meeting with success in their efforts to capture the A. F. of L. organization. If they succeed, an industrial upheaval throughout the entire United States will come. Not only organized labor but organized capital will be revolutionized."

SCHOOLBOY STRIKE ENDS.

Walkout in Jersey Complete Victory for All Concerned.

The strike of the Summit (N. J.) High School boys ended this morning in a complete victory for everybody concerned. The boys got what they struck for, which was a holiday, while the school authorities were able to point with pride this morning to the fact that the strikers were hard at work again to-day, extracting the cube root of the imperative mood, conjugating the binomial theorem, and determining the specific gravity of the ablative absolute. Fifty of them struck yesterday, and they are going to pay the full penalty of the crime. Supt. Sprague grimly announced that he was going to mark them absent.

INCOME TAX TO YIELD \$50,000,000, SAYS SMITH

Governor Tells Uptown Club Retrenchment in Cost of Government is Imperative.

Gov. A. E. Smith was the principal speaker at the formal opening of the Uptown Club at No. 11 East 45th Street with a luncheon to-day. Lawrence Elliman presided, and about 200 were present.

"Retrenchment in the cost of operating the State Government is an imperative need," said the Governor. "The income tax which will be collected next spring will bring in between \$50,000,000 and \$55,000,000,000. In this State there are 187 commissions or like bodies. I hope to reduce this number to twelve big commissions."

"In Gov. Hill's administration it cost \$12,000,000 a year to run the State. Now it costs \$35,000,000, and we are using the same form of government as we did forty years ago."

GROCERY PARTNERS HELD UP AND ROBBED AT CONEY

Early Morning Visitors Interrupt Men as They Are Counting Day's Receipts.
