50 PER CENT. STEEL OUTPUT IS REACHED AT PLANT IN GARY

Striker Shot and Many Beaten in Clash With Youngstown Police.

CHICAGO, Oct. 14.—Fifty per cent. production had been reached to-day at the United States Steel Corporation's plant at Gary, Ind. It was announced officially and reports from throughout the Chicago district were that the general industrial situation was better than at any time since the steel strike, now in its fourth week, was called.

Company officials asserted 90 per cent. of the employees had returned to work at the Inland and Wisconsin Steel Company's plants at South Chicago. Waukegan mills also reported more men at work.

John H. DeYoung, chairman of the Chicago committee for the steel workers, denied claims of factory heads of great numbers of men returning to work.

YOUNGSTOWN, O., Oct. 14.—One man was shot, many beaten and several arrested when strikers clashed with city police at the plant of the Carnegie Steel Company here early to-day. The trouble started when police attempted to disperse a crowd of men who were stoning returning workers.

Operations were resumed this morning on a larger scale than had been predicted, and mill officials reported an increasing number of men returning to work.

PITTSBURGH, Oct. 14.—The steel strike situation in the Pittsburgh district remained deadlocked to-day.

According to the latest statement from the Carnegie Steel Company, largest subsidiary of the United States Steel Corporation, that concern is rapidly returning to normal conditions, with 75 per cent. of its blast furnaces operating and an average of about 500 men returning to work daily.

Strike headquarters declared few, if any, men have returned to work in the Pittsburgh district recently.

PLAN SUBMITTED FOR ARBITRATION OF STEEL STRIKE

Committee Makes No Recommendation to Industrial Conference.

WASHINGTON, Oct. 14.—Labor's demand that the nation-wide steel strike be arbitrated was reported to the National Industrial Conference to-day by the Steering Committee of Fifteen without recommendations, but with the suggestion that if arbitration is undertaken the proposed Committee of Six be chosen by members of the conference from among members or non-members.

There was no immediate action on the report, the conference adjourning for an hour after there had been a sharp debate over interpretation of the rules.

Six resolutions dealing with the relations between capital and labor and particularly the right of labor to deal with employers through unions were introduced by members of the public group to-day.

John Spargo of New York offered a resolution proposing that the conference endorse the following principles: "The recognition without qualification of the right of workers to combine into unions and to form combinations of unions."

"Making it a penal offense for any organization or industry to refuse to hear the claims, demands or complaints of organized labor as voiced by union officials and recommending that Congress enact laws to make this principle immediately applicable to every department of the Govern-

ment except the army and navy and to every industrial corporation or concern. "Providing that any attempt on the part of any employer to penalize any worker for lawful activity in promoting the interests of any union be made unlawful. "Advocating the establishment in every State of a special group representing capital, labor and the general public, to inquire into charges of suppression of the rights of free speech and assembly and to order the removal of any prohibition of these rights which may have been issued without cause."

U. S. INTERESTS TO DEVELOP 24 CITIES FOR PERUVIANS

Water Supply, Draining and Paving Systems Being Arranged, Says President.

LIMA, Peru, Oct. 14.—President Leguia in his inaugural address yesterday announced that the Government was negotiating with powerful American interests for the installation of water supply, draining and paving systems for twenty-four of the largest cities and towns of the Republic. He declared the negotiations were approaching a successful conclusion and that the project would shortly be placed before the Congress for its ratification.

President Leguia also announced that negotiations were well advanced for the construction of a railway from the coast near Paiza, in Northern Peru, to the navigable waters of the Marañon River. He declared the railway would open a region capable of supporting a population of 2,000,000 people.

SEIZED EGGS GO TO ENGLAND

150,000 Dozens Taken in Detroit Will Be Shipped Soon.

DETROIT, Oct. 14.—One hundred and eighty thousand dozens of eggs, seized here in August by Federal authorities, soon will be shipped to England to relieve the food situation there.

This became known to-day following granting of a writ of restitution by Federal Judge Tuttle restoring the eggs to Colonel Fowcote and Son, London, England, owners.

TWENTY-SEVEN WARSHIPS LOST BY FRANCE IN WAR

Battleships Danton, Gaulois and Suffren, All Torpedoed in Mediterranean, Among Them.

PARIS, Oct. 14.—Twenty-seven war vessels were lost by France during the period of hostilities. It is shown by an order of the day issued by Georges Leygues, the Minister of Marine, citing this number of warcraft destroyed. In-

cluded in this list are three battleships, the Danton, the Gaulois and the Suffren. The Danton, of 18,000 tons, was sunk by a German submarine in the Mediterranean on March 18, 1917, with the loss of 236 men. The Gaulois, of 11,000 tons, which aided in the Dardanelles bombardment, during which she was damaged but afterward repaired, was likewise torpedoed in the Mediterranean by a German U boat, on Dec. 27, 1918. The Suffren, of 12,500 tons, another of the French fleet at the Dardanelles, was lost with all on board during the engagement, in December, 1918, the German Admiralty announcing that she had been torpedoed and sunk.
