

"INVISIBLE RULE" HEAD HERE SOUGHT BY GRAND JURY

(Continued From First Page.)

would inquire particularly into the reason for the sudden cessation of the raids.

In a talk with reporters this afternoon Smith intimated that the trail of "police graft" might lead beyond the borders of the city and specifically to a recent meeting at Atlantic City, where plans are said to have been perfected for "throwing New York wide open." The names, or some of the names, of persons present at the meeting are available for the Grand Jury, it was said.

Among those waiting to testify was Detective Sgt. Martin, formerly attached to the staff of Deputy Police Commissioner William J. Lahey. Another waiting witness refused to give his name. He conferred with Assistant District Attorney Unger.

The "inside workings" of the New York police force are to undergo the scrutiny of the Grand Jury as part of a general investigation of the Government of the City of New York, it was unofficially announced to-day.

Recently the Grand Jury wrote to Gov. Smith of a "crime overshadowing" the Mayor's charge of a traction strike conspiracy. Since then there has been much mystery in its activities, and District Attorney Swann is known to have been asked to appear as a witness and waive immunity.

Nine witnesses were examined yesterday, some of them from the Mayor's office.

GRAND JURY HAS WIDE POWERS OF INQUIRY.

A Grand Jury is privileged by law to concern itself only with such inquiries as appear to justify that body in hearing evidence tending to show that a crime has been committed.

This Grand Jury, originally ordered by Gov. Smith to investigate criminal anarchy, and later shifted, at the request of the District Attorney, to an investigation of Mayor Hylan's conspiracy charges against Interborough officials and employees, apparently has veered completely around in its line of inquiry since it rebelled against the presentation of evidence in the Interborough matter by Mr. Swann.

Unofficial information inlets that the present investigation centres around City Hall and is a sort of backfire resultant from developments during the course of the inquiry into the Mayor's charges under the guidance of the District Attorney.

Investigation of the police, it is said, will concern itself chiefly with vice, though some prominent police officials and a number of influential and well known citizens probably will be subpoenaed as witnesses.

Assistant District Attorney James Smith is the vice expert of the District Attorney's office and has been connected with several investigations of alleged police irregularities. Some of these cases, known to be of extreme importance, remain unsettled.

COPELAND TO BE CALLED SOON, IS REPORT.

It could not be ascertained whether Mr. Smith and John T. Dooling, another Assistant District Attorney examined yesterday by the Grand Jury, were asked to waive immunity. Nor could it be learned along just what line they were examined. Mr. Dooling for a long time had charge of the investigation into the high cost of milk, and it is presumed that the Grand Jury is also continuing its inquiry into that subject on a broader scale.

It was rumored that Health Commissioner Copeland might be a witness in this investigation.

It is possible that the District Attorney has already been examined in connection with the transit investigation, though Mr. Swann refused to say whether he had or not. He is known, however, to take the position that the District Attorney should not refuse to waive immunity if asked to by the Grand Jury. In view of this and the fact that he was called into a formal session of that body recently, it is thought not unlikely that he has told the Grand Jury whatever they asked him.

In thus broadening its work to include several of the most vital branches of the City and County Administration, the extraordinary Grand Jury is acting upon its own initiative.

The District Attorney is not even presenting evidence, nor is Chief Assistant District Attorney Talley, who aided Mr. Swann before the Grand Jury during the early part of the Interborough investigation, appearing in the Grand Jury room.

TELLS DYSPEPTICS WHAT TO EAT

Practically every one in Hylan's office heard.

Following Gov. Smith's refusal to name a special committee, District Attorney to conduct this inquiry, the Grand Jury took the investigation into its own hands and the District Attorney declines to summon any more witnesses on his initiative. Evidence is now being presented by Assistant District Attorney Unger.

When the Grand Jury sent for Mr. Unger recently, Mr. Swann told newspaper men Mr. Unger had reported to him he was not quite clear as to what the Grand Jury wanted with him.

Apparently the Mayor's office is being raked very thoroughly. Practically every employee of his immediate and personal staff who handles his correspondence has appeared before the Grand Jury within the last few days and a cabinet file of letters also has been in the Grand Jury room and presumably under scrutiny. Those examined from the Mayor's office yesterday were:

John J. Glennon, chief clerk; James T. Curtis, clerk; Joseph G. Conlon, clerk; James T. Pittsmon, clerk; Edward J. McLaughlin, accountant; Miss Loretta McNamee, stenographer; Frank J. Fitzgerald, clerk; Sidney R. Keip, stenographer; and James J. Morrow, clerk.

Mayor Hylan was one of the first to be questioned in view of the fact that he brought the charges against the Interborough officials and employees. Since the character of the inquiry has so materially changed it is thought likely the Mayor may be questioned further.

District Attorney Swann refused to comment on the new turn the Grand Jury's work has taken and the members of that body are all silent.

\$2,000,000 DREAM CASE ENDS IN PASTOR'S FAVOR

Jury Decides Man Who Asked \$3,000 Payment Had "No Cause for Action."

"No cause for action" was the verdict brought in to-day by a Circuit Court Jury sitting in Paterson, N. J., in the suit of Daniel Balsinger, to force Frederick Lochrs, pastor of the Congregation of the Enlightenment of Soul and Spirit, No. 262 Market Street, to pay a note for \$5,000. Mrs. Sophie Sauter, Treasurer of the congregation, and Mrs. Marie Blumer, Secretary, were co-defendants with Lochrs.

The pastor testified Balsinger told him that in a dream a negro woman told him over \$2,000,000 worth of jewelry and gold lay buried in Balsinger's farm in Oakland, and that a few nights later she explained that the buried valuables, when recovered, were to be used exclusively in church work. She described the man who would dig up the treasure and the description fitted him exactly. Lochrs testified Balsinger told him.

Lochrs said he agreed to buy the farm and gave Balsinger \$20 in cash and a promissory note for \$5,000. Lochrs and the two women dug up much of the farm in a search for the treasure. Balsinger denied that he told the pastor anything about buried treasure.

LADY ASTOR SURE TO WIN OFFICE, SAYS HER SISTER

Popular in England Because of Her American Spirit, Asserts Mrs. Gibson.

Lady Nancy Astor, who is seeking election to the British House of Commons, will show Americans that it pays to remain American in spirit.

Her sister, Mrs. Charles Dana Gibson, wife of the famous artist. Mrs. Gibson, who was Miss Irene Langhorne, one of the famous Langhorne sisters of Richmond, Va., declared her sister was popular in Plymouth because she treats England as if it were Virginia.

She isn't apologizing for being an American and she acts toward the English just as she would toward the people in her native State.

"My sister has been living in England eight years," said Mrs. Gibson. "She likes the English people and has entered into their life, but is proud of nothing more than that of being an American, and especially a Virginian."

"I think my sister will be elected because I have never known her to fail in anything she started to do. She is a wonderful little woman and I'm immensely proud of her."

PREMIER FOR LADY ASTOR.

Lloyd George Supports Her in Race for Commons.

PLYMOUTH, Nov. 6 (By the Associated Press).—Lady Astor has received the personal endorsement of Premier Lloyd George in her candidacy for a seat in the House of Commons from the Plymouth District.

Lady Astor's American birth was foisted into the campaign last night when she was asked, "Are there any English women quite as fit to be the first woman member of the British Parliament as an American?"

"There are a great many, but there are none who know the needs and conditions of Plymouth as I do," she said.

DESTROYER LAUNCH CAPSIZES—THREE MISSING.

NEWPORT, R. I., Nov. 6.—Three men were missing after a motor launch from the destroyer Long had capsized in Narragansett Bay while conducting radio experiments during the gale to-day. Six of the crew of nine were rescued in an exhausted condition. They were taken to the torpedo station and the Naval Training Station to recover. Missions were sent out to look for the missing men.

SENATE COMMITTEE TO MEET BODIES OF U. S. HEROES.

WASHINGTON, Nov. 6.—Vice President Marshall to-day named a committee to represent the Senate in receiving the bodies of 131 American soldiers who were killed or died in Northern Russia. The bodies will arrive in New York Sunday on the steamer "Albatross." Senator Wadsworth will head the committee.


