## 121. W. W. SEIZED IN WEST VIRGINIA MINE LOCAL RAID

Failure of Men to Return to Work Causes Fuel Shortage in Some Sections.

MORANTOWN, W. Va., Nov. 15.—Department of Justice agents with eight deputy sheriffs, to-day arrested twelve members of the Scott's Run Local of the I. W. W. They were brought here and placed in jail.

Four foreigners, alleged members of the Grant Town Local of the I. W. W., are in jail at Fairmont to-day charged by Federal authorities, with radical activities in Marion County. The men were arrested late last night by Department of Justice agents who were rushed into that region several days ago following announcement by State officials that radical agitators were busy in Northern West Virginia coal fields.

## RED CROSS SEAL APPEAL

Surgeon General Asks Schools and Churches to Help Sale.

WASHINGTON, Nov. 15.—Schools, churches and synagogues throughout the United States were asked to-day by Surgeon General Blue to co-operate with the Public Health Service in the sale of Red Cross Christmas seals on Dec. 5 and 7. The proclamation said: "Over 150,000 Americans die annually from tuberculosis, an appalling waste of life when we consider that tuberculosis is a clear, preventable disease. Moreover, because this loss of life is toll almost entirely from the ranks of the young adult population, the health of the world over have come to consider the control of tuberculosis as still the most pressing problem confronting them."

## BREWERS APPEAL TO HIGHEST COURT FROM 'DRY' RULING

Expect Final Verdict Promptly After Three Decisions Here Adverse to "Wets."

Seeking to overcome the setback to "wet" hopes yesterday by the decisions of Federal Judges Learned Hand, Knox and Ross, Attorneys Root, Clark, Buckner and Howland, counsel for Jacob Ruppert, Inc., brewers, started an appeal to the United States Supreme Court to-day from the opinion of Judge Hand that the Volstead-Warime Prohibition Enforcement Act was constitutional and ought to be enforced.

Members of the law firm said that under priority to be granted because of the urgency of the issue, a decision by the highest court of the nation was hoped for in a few weeks.

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## CHINESE SUES YOUNG WIFE WHO PREFERRED OTHER MAN

Restaurant Man Charges Wife Left Him Soon After Arrival in America.

## Lady Astor Votes Early In Commons Race To-Day; Odds 20 to 1 in Her Favor

## American Viscountess Hailed by Crowds as Her Carriage Proceeds to Polls.

PLYMOUTH, Nov. 15.—The halcyon which will decide whether Lady Astor is to succeed her husband in the House of Commons and as the American wife of a British peer become the first active woman member of Parliament began in the Sutton constituency of Plymouth early to-day.

The serious business of marking the ballots came after a fortnight of intense electioneering in the constituency, but it will be nearly a fortnight more before it becomes possible for those to-day claiming the victory for their respective favorites among the three candidates to be sure of the outcome, as the poll will not be announced until Nov. 18. The delay is necessary because of the considerable number of absent voters, largely men serving with the colors abroad.

Lady Astor went to the polls to-day a 20 to 1 favorite, with no takers. She declared—and her backers believe it—that she will have a plurality of 15,000, 50 per cent. more than her husband had in the last election.

## CLOTURE RULE VOTED BY SENATE TO SPEED TREATY

(Continued From First Page.)

To 43 rejected a substitute proposed by Senator Hitchcock. MONROE DOCTRINE RESERVATION ADOPTED BY SENATE.

Taking up the committee's Monroe Doctrine reservation the Senate voted down, 41 to 43, a substitute by Senator Hitchcock to declare the doctrine in no way "impaired or affected" by the treaty.

The committee's Monroe Doctrine reservation was adopted by a vote of 55 to 33.

An amendment by Senator Hale to a committee reservation so as to make it include questions regarding boundaries of the United States and its possessions, was adopted 52 to 40, with party lines on both sides divided.

## SHANTUNG RESERVATION IS ADOPTED, 55 TO 41.

The Senate took up the Shantung reservation by voting down, 50 to 42, a substitute by Senator McCumber proposing that the United States "refrain from entering into" the Shantung settlement. Under the committee wording the United States would "withhold its assent."

## NEW DEMOCRATIC RESERVATION TO ARTICLE X.

In addition, Senator Hitchcock presented a new substitute for the Article Ten Reservation already adopted by the Senate. It proposes that the United States "does not assume any obligations" regarding the article's guarantees until in any particular case Congress shall so provide.

## MARSHALL RULES THAT ALL SIDES MAY HAVE A CHANCE.

A parliamentary jangle developed when Vice President Marshall undertook to state his construction of the cloture rule. Senator La Follette made a point of order contending that the chair should put the motion.
