

EBERT STILL WAILS OVER PEACE TERMS

Tells Germans Their Future Years Are at the Mercy of Foreigners.

BERLIN, Jan. 2.—President Ebert in a New Year manifesto said: "In the year just ended chaos was averted and the unity of the empire was maintained and consolidated. Under pressure of a reckless force we were compelled to conclude a peace treaty, entering the honor and welfare of our nation and placing the fruits of our work of past and future years at the mercy of foreigners. "The year which begins must decide whether Germany, despite all difficulties, will maintain herself as a nation and state and develop her economic life on a sound basis, or whether, through internal quarrels, she will definitely collapse and bury the hopes even of her future generations. "With these prospects of our fate before my eyes, I urge all those calling themselves Germans, in view of the common danger, to close their ranks in order that each one, according to his capacity, may help to the utmost in the restoration of the Fatherland."

U. S. FUND AIDS GERMAN CHILDREN

Donation of 2,500,000 Marks Will Restore More Than 2,000 to Health.

BERLIN, Jan. 2.—The American Section of the German Red Cross has received 2,500,000 marks from relief committees in the United States for the benefit of tubercular and undernourished German children. More than 2,000 of these children will thus be able to go to sections where climatic and food conditions promise them health. Herbert Hoover's plan to co-ordinate American food relief so far as it concerns the transfer of personal donations from Americans to Germans is hailed here with enthusiasm. It is expected to terminate abuses resulting from indiscriminate shipments through American forwarding agents, many packages, it is said, arriving in poor condition.

AMNESTY FOR MEXICANS.

Carrazas Announced Fugitives May Be Pardoned for Offences. MEXICO CITY, Jan. 2.—Amnesty may be granted Mexican fugitives in foreign countries by the Government, President Carranza declared at his New Year's reception at the Palace. Col. Antonio Jauregui, survivor of the War of French Intervention, in a petition asked that former Federal officers be pardoned for offences charged against them. Many of these were involved in the revolt of 1912. President Carranza counseled Col. Jauregui to "wait tranquilly" for disposition of the matter.

Sir Frank Cavendish Lascelles Dead.

LONDON, Jan. 2.—Sir Frank Cavendish Lascelles, British Ambassador to Germany from 1895 to 1908, died here to-day. He has held many posts in diplomatic service, serving as Minister to Roumania in 1886 and to Persia in 1891, and as Ambassador to Russia in 1894. He was born on March 22, 1831.

Pope to Receive Bavarian Envoy.

ROME, Thursday, Jan. 1.—Baron von Ritter, Bavarian Ambassador to the Vatican, was received to-day by Cardinal Gasparri, Papal Secretary of State, for the first time since the cessation of the war. It is announced that Baron von Ritter will soon be received in audience by the Pope.

SOVIETS WANT PEACE BUT THERE'S "LIMIT."

Willing to Make Big Concessions Says Delegate but Not With Gen. Denekine.

DORPAT, Jan. 2.—Bolshevik Russia is willing to make great concessions to the big powers in the interests of peace, but will not hold out the olive branch to Gen. Denekine, according to M. Kilibak, secretary of the Soviet delegation conferring with Estonian delegates here. "A year ago we would have considered peace with Gen. Denekine," he said, "but now it is a fight to the finish. M. Kilibak added the Bolshevik army now numbered 250,000 men, and declared it to be "invincible." "Soviet Russia, however," he declared, "would be glad to disband the entire force if peace with the world could be achieved."

FLOODS MENACE FRENCH PLANTS

Seine and Oise Reach the Danger Stage—Inhabitants Are Ordered Away.

PARIS, Jan. 2.—Directors of railroads and of plants endangered by the rising waters of the Seine have been summoned by the Ministry of Transportation to discuss measures to protect their property. The flood is higher than that of 1910, and the crest is not expected until Sunday. It is expected the rise will to-day reach the 1210 stage. The Prefect of Champagne has notified inhabitants to leave.

DRYS BUSY IN ITALY; NO DRINK AFTER 3 P M

Rule, However, Applies Only to Liquor Containing More Than 20 Per Cent. Alcohol.

ROME, Jan. 2.—Prohibitionists claim their first notable achievement in Italy in the issuance of a decree by which the sale of liquor containing more than 20 per cent. of alcohol will be permitted only between 8 o'clock in the morning and 2 o'clock P. M. on Saturdays. Sales must cease at noon on Sundays and are completely prohibited on holidays, according to the decree.
