Three of the Nation's most prominent women have accepted positions on the Committee of Arrangements for the National Interchurch Movement Conference to be held in Washington on Feb. 7, 8 and 9. They are Mrs. Woodrow Wilson, Mrs. Robert Lansing and Mrs. Josephus Daniels.

The conference will bring together at Washington 250 Christian women from all parts of America, prominent in social, club, business, educational, political, missionary and religious activities, to interpret to them the interchurch world movement. The program calling for the conference was issued by Secretary of State Robert Lansing, Chairman of the General Committee, John H. Mott, Chairman of the Executive Committee, William Hiram Poulkes, Vice-Chairman of the Executive Committee, and S. Earl Taylor, General Secretary. 
